adult populations have been reduced to the direst misery by the spread of typhus. An investigator for the League of Red Cross Societies says:

"Misery greater in extent and intensity than the modern world has ever before witnessed exists in the broad belt lying between the Baltic, the Adriatic and the Black Sea. In this great area there is generally an absolute lack of medicines and sanitary appliances; doctors, nurses and hospital equipment are practically non-existent; food and clothing are insufficient to make life itself tolerable, and disease and suffering are present in practi-cally every household."

The British Empire War Relief Fund

has been undertaken by all British peoples to help mitigate the suffering of plague-stricken Europe and to save the children. It will be administered in Europe in co-operation with the League of Red Cross Societies.
