## Jack Ellis Seeks Championship Match With M. Sheridan

Jack Ellis, the Vancouver policeman, who won the Canadian athletic championship, is said to desire a meeting with M. Sheridan, the American champion, next year. Both are cops.

Vancouver sports have arranged a table in which his best records are compared with those of Sheridan, to the latter's disadvantage. These records, however, were made at different times, and so can hardly be taken as a criterion of what he can do in all-round competition, where he would have to jump from one event to another, with hardly enough time between times to catch his breath.

His record shows that he has done 10-4-5 in the 100 yds in the sixteen shot-put, 6-0-9 in the high jump, 4-3 in the half-mile walk, 14-5 in the hammer throw, 34-4 in the pole vault, 16-5 in the hurdles, 1-38-1 in the running broad jump, 31 feet in the fifty-yards, and 4-2 in the mile run. This would give him an edge on Sheridan in seven of the ten events, while Sheridan is all-around competition records are considered.

Gillis does not look the ideal all-around champion. Lee Tuckett, cuts rather a strange figure in the turf with his great height and spare build, but he is a great mark to Gillis. The Canadian stands 6 feet 4 inches in height, but weighs only 165 pounds, whereas Sheridan, who is 5 feet 10 inches shorter, but weighs considerably more.

It is claimed that Sheridan, who holds three Canadian records, besides the all-around championship, has never been properly trained. Founding the game while doing his duty as a policeman has been about all the real hard work he has done. Now, however, that he has proved his prowess, his club proposes to see that he gets the proper kind of instruction and training.

It is planned to send Gillis and his brother, Dan, on a tour of Eastern Canada, and the United States next spring. He will start training for this along about February, and in May he will put three series of private tests, during the course of which he will compete in all the events of the all-around program, and he will be scored according to American rules, so as to get a fair idea of his position.

700 he will consider himself justified in entering the lists against Sheridan.

## WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC

One of Four New Comers Led Astray, Says Mr. Shearer.

At a meeting of the Household Economic Association yesterday afternoon, in the Canadian Institute, an address was delivered by Rev. J. G. Shearer, on the white slave traffic.

The speaker stated that every year over 15,000 girls from foreign countries come into Canada and the United States, and of these, at least one quarter were added to the white slaves, while many thousands were recruited from the girls of our own country and the States.

The question of boarding houses was also discussed. He said that many girls on their arrival in the city did not know the nature of the place where they secured rooms. In many cases they stayed in houses of a questionable nature. If they were not influenced by the other inmates to adopt their form of life, they had a bad reputation, which would follow them wherever they went.

There should be no double standard of morality. A man should be marked just the same as a woman for his sins. In this country it is not so. Many men that have turned girls into the downward path are to-day received in the best of society.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—Dolly Parrnell, a popular musical comedy actress, was married to-day to Prince Nower All Khan, son of one of the most powerful of the native rulers of India. The prince presented his bride with jewels valued at \$100,000.
