### CITY WELL ABLE TO GIVE WATER TO N. TORONTO

Acting Mayor Ward Says Ultimate Annexation is Inevitable—To Revive Fruit Market Plan.

North Toronto's request that the city supply it with water will probably be granted. Acting Mayor Ward stated yesterday that he could see no objection, remarking also that the annexation of the northern suburb was merely a matter of time. It is probable that the other members of the board of control will take a like position when the board confers with representatives of North Toronto next Tuesday. At this meeting the price and other details will be considered. That the scheme is entirely practicable is agreed by City Engineer Rust and Waterworks Engineer Fellows. Mr. Rust says the city can supply a water pressure of 30 pounds at the North Toronto town hall. The city mains extend as far north as Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The city engineer considers that the town should take the responsibility of laying the necessary mains to connect their pumping station with the city's 12-inch main.

The town needs 200,000 gallons daily. This means a tax of only about one-half of one per cent. on the pumping capacity of the Toronto plant.

**Fears More Typhoid.**  
City Engineer Rust is opposing as strenuously as ever the idea of pumping out the waterworks tunnel so as to test its soundness. He told the acting mayor yesterday that, in case of another outbreak of typhoid, would result from using the old abandoned water pipe, as well as the risk of a shortage of water. However, the city is asking for tenders for the work.

The board of control was not represented on the joint to Windsor yesterday to inspect the Ontario Asylum Block Company's plant, but a number of the aldermen took in the trip, which was by special car. They will return to-day.

There are three more smallpox patients at the Swiss Cottage. Two are parents of two children living on Farmouth-road who passed thru all the stages of smallpox and recovered from it without the parents being aware of the nature of the disease. The third of the new patients is a child eighteen months old, who contracted the disease from the same source.

**Artilleryman Shoots Himself.**  
KINGSTON, June 17.—Fred Wirtz, aged 40, "A" Battery R.C.A., shot himself thru the brain in the Troquois Hotel, Ontario-street, shortly before noon. He was taken to the Hotel Dieu.

### ASSIGNEE SOLD TOO LOW

Must Make Up Difference to the Hughes Estate.

In the Atkinson v. Cassenly case in the non-jury assize court, which occupied four days, and in which the plaintiff asked for an order to have the defendant removed as assignee of the Hughes' estate at Tottenham, Justice Latchford found that the defendant had entered into an agreement whereby the L. C. Hughes' residence, which he valued at \$2500, was sold to co-defendant McGee for \$1900, and that the G. C. Hughes' block, valued at \$2125, was sold to defendant James Campbell for \$1600. His lordship ruled, therefore, that the difference in the amounts, which is about \$2400, should be paid to the estate and at the same time appointed the Toronto General Trusts as assignees. Defendants pay costs.

### HOW RAILWAYS WERE 'SKINNED'

New Order Respecting Berths Put End to Ingenious Tricks.

"This berth reservation was one of the greatest skin games worked by the public," said J. D. McDonald, Grand Trunk district passenger agent, yesterday, in discussing the order issued by the railway companies that no berth reservations will be made in future unless paid for at the time.

Mr. McDonald explained that the tricks were played largely by hotels. They phoned the railway offices saying they wished a number of berths reserved for fictitious persons. Later these berths were sold to real travelers at 50c or \$1 commission.

Another grievance of the railways has been caused by travelers who, not being sure at what time or day they were going, engaged berths on various trains.

### IMMIGRATION FIGURES

In the Last Ten Years There Have Been 1,445,288 Arrivals.

OTTAWA, June 17.—Immigration to Canada in the last ten years totals 1,445,288, according to a handbook prepared by the department of immigration.

The fiscal year recently closed eclipsed all others in the volume of immigration, the arrivals numbering 208,774. Since 1902, when the deportation regulations became effective, 2883 people have been deported, the greatest number being in 1908, when the total was 1748. Last year it was 734, of those deported Englishmen predominated, being upwards of 2400.

The average percentage on which bonuses are paid is about 16.47 British; 5.60 American and 10.90 continental.

### ELUBED GUARDS, KILLS SELF

Postmaster at Fassifern, Ont., Cuts His Throat.

ALEXANDRIA, Ont. June 17.—Postmaster E. A. Newman of Fassifern cut his throat this morning at 2 o'clock with a razor, and expired immediately. Deceased was 37 years of age, married, and removed from Montreal to Fassifern about three years ago, where he purchased a store. He had been drinking heavily.

A couple of neighbors were spending last night watching him. About 2 o'clock Newman got up and went to a bureau drawer evidently to get a cigar, but actually to secure a razor. Showing it to the guards, he blew out his lamp, and before they could realize the situation, he had cut his throat.

### PRESIDENT GOODERHAM'S GIFT

Geo. Gooderham, M.L.A., president of the Canadian National Exhibition, will present to the association a reproduction of the fountain in front of St. Peter's, Rome, which is the work of Michael Angelo. It will be built of Carara marble, 24 feet high and 34 feet across the base. It will be placed in the Grand Plaza between the transportation and manufacturers buildings. Its cost is estimated at \$14,000.

**C. O. F. Increase Tax.**  
MONTREAL, June 17.—The Canadian Order of Foresters have decided to increase their capitation tax from \$1 to \$1.20 per annum.

**Aeroplane Trip Postponed.**  
ROCHESTER, N.Y., June 17.—Owing to unavoidable difficulty in getting the proper grade of Oregon spruce for his biplane, Dr. William Greene, who had intended making the aeroplane trip across Lake Ontario this month, will probably postpone the attempt to early in July.
