

## ACTIVE, STEADY TRADE IN MINING ISSUES

Interest Chiefly in Porcupine  
Stocks—Holly Makes New  
Record.

The mining market at the Standard Exchange was fairly active in the two-hour session yesterday, and the volume of business transacted amounted to over 100,000 shares. The active issues were Apex, Jupiter, McIntyre and Peterson Lake. The market generally has a good appearance and any buying orders of consequence would immediately be reflected in an upward movement. Silver was 1-8 lower than Friday at 57-8.

The chief interest seemed to be centered in the better class of gold stocks. Silver, with the exception of Peterson Lake, appeared to be somewhat neglected.

Apex was one of the strong, active features, opening at 8 and selling up to 8 1/2 on the close. Over 42,000 shares of the stock changed hands during the morning.

Hollinger established a high record price, selling up to \$30.50, ten cents higher than the previous high-water mark made Friday. The high price was paid for a lot of 100 shares. The stock closed at \$30, and over 800 shares were sold.

Big Dome was stronger, opening at \$28.50 and selling up to \$28.75, closing at that price. Dome Lake sold from \$28 down to \$27. Foyle was in demand at 75 bid, but no stock was forthcoming at this figure. Homestake held steady, selling at 45.

Strength was shown by Jupiter, and 14,000 shares changed hands. The stock opened at 22 and advanced to 22 1/2, closing at the high point.

There was an inclination in McIntyre to ease off slightly after opening at 106, a point up from Friday's close; it sold down to 105, but closed stronger at 104. McIntyre Extension was stronger, selling up to 31 1/2. West Dome sold at 16 1/2, and West Dome Consolidated at 25.

In the silver stocks Peterson Lake showed the most activity, but was a little easier in price. It opened at 36, sold up 1/2, but eased off to 35 1/2 at the close.

There was only a small amount of trading in Timiskaming, which held about steady between 70 1/2 and 71. Bailey sold at 5, and Beaver from 44 down to 43 1-2. Nipissing sold at \$7.70.

## Mining Notes

Only two mines shipped bullion from the Cobalt camp since the first of the year. Nipissing this week shipped a total of 214 bars, containing 251,975.15 ounces, valued at \$123,198.75, and the Crown Reserve sent out 23 bars. The shipments of bullion for the year to date are as follows:

Last year the Province of Ontario produced about one-twelfth as much gold as the United States. Four years ago it was not on the chart as one of the gold mining areas. We are not at the end of the first chapter yet.

From the 335-foot level of the workings of the J. B. property of La Rose Consolidated, which adjoins the Chambers-Perland, says the Cobalt Nugget, some diamond drill holes will be put down the work to begin shortly. This work has a two-fold object. There appears to be considerable faulting in that quarter and the drilling will provide the desired information. Also the experience at the Nipissing and the Chambers-Perland is that values occur in the lower conglomerate. On the J. B. there are a number of cal-

cite veins in the slate and if conditions prove identical on the latter property there is reason to hope for values in the lower conglomerate.

COBALT, Jan. 15.—Last year's Timiskaming report promises to be an optimistic one. The production was 1,860,000 ounces. It is said that costs will be low despite the extensive mine development plan followed by the company.

The Cobalt Lake Mining Co. is diamond drilling from the Cobalt Lake bed.

## LOCAL STOCKS ACTIVE AT HIGHER PRICES

Broader Market at Toronto Exchange and Several Issues Make Advances.

Saturday's short session was the most active witnessed on the Toronto Stock Exchange since before the war. Several stocks were moderately active and there was a material broadening out of enquiry. One piece of favorable news Saturday was the declaration of a quarterly dividend of one per cent. by the Canadian Pacific, thus placing the stock on a four per cent. basis. The news had little time to get abroad, and only 25 shares of the stock sold at the minimum price of 58. Cement was the most active issue and a further rise was made to 51. Profit-taking was spread around 50 and the price receded to 49 1/2 at the close. Bulls on this stock are now calling for the payment of a six per cent. dividend. This view is by no means general.

Maple Leaf had a continuance of strength and closed at 71, a gain of a point from Friday. Steamships, General Electric, Steel of Canada and Steel Corporation showed strength, and advances were registered in each. The only activity in the unlisted shares was in Ames-Holden, which sold up as high as 23 1/2 for a broken lot, a rise of over two points. Many of the Canadian listed and unlisted will be actively dealt in on the New York curb from now on, and with the broader field for investment a much more active as well as a rising market is confidently expected.

### FUTURE PREDICTED FOR GIFFORD MINE

Hamilton B. Willis, in his weekly market letter, says of the Gifford: President F. B. Moore of this company leaves for Cobalt tonight to engage the services of a thoroughly experienced mine manager to start aggressive development at the property.

### WINNIPEG GRAIN MARKET.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 15.—May wheat closed \$1.24 1/2, up 1/2. The market was very quiet for the morning, which was 1/2 up from Friday's close. July gained 1/2, but closed 1/2 under the high of the morning. Export trade was curtailed by limited offerings.

Exporters worked a few loads from seaboard. During the first hour rumors were quickly responded to an advance. Later mills were buyers, and other export houses, with big American connections, got into the game, and it was a broad, strong market.

The cash situation was very strong also. There was a demand for wheat in all positions, and May price was bid for to go to Duluth.

Oats were fairly active and firm. Spot wheat prices presented an interesting series. No. 1 northern at Port William was 46 under May, and No. 2 northern 6 1/2 under.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATION.

The head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District, or by proxy made at any Dominion Lands Agency, (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Within six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the limits of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. The residence is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Within six months' residence in each of three years, and cultivation of three acres of land, or a quarter-section patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of the three years.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or infertile land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
