

# RUGBY VARSITY HOLDS SECRET PRACTICE

## POSSIBLE TIES IN THE SENIOR UNIONS

Argos, Varsity and Torontos Need Victories to Cinch the Titles.

Toronto fans are vitally interested in the rugby games at the week-end. The three senior unions are likely to be decided or else a tie-up is in order in all three. Naturally the Varsity-McGill clash at Montreal is causing the most talk. The blue and white clean-cut victory of Stag's men here make them favorites for the college union title, and Saturday tells the tale.

5. Candidates living at the training house will not eat any food as prescribed by the head coach.
6. Candidates may not use profanity or commit unsportsmanlike acts in practice or in games.
7. All candidates are expected to obtain good averages in scholastic work to remain on the squad.
8. Expulsion from Pennsylvania football will be one of the penalties for failure to obey these rules.

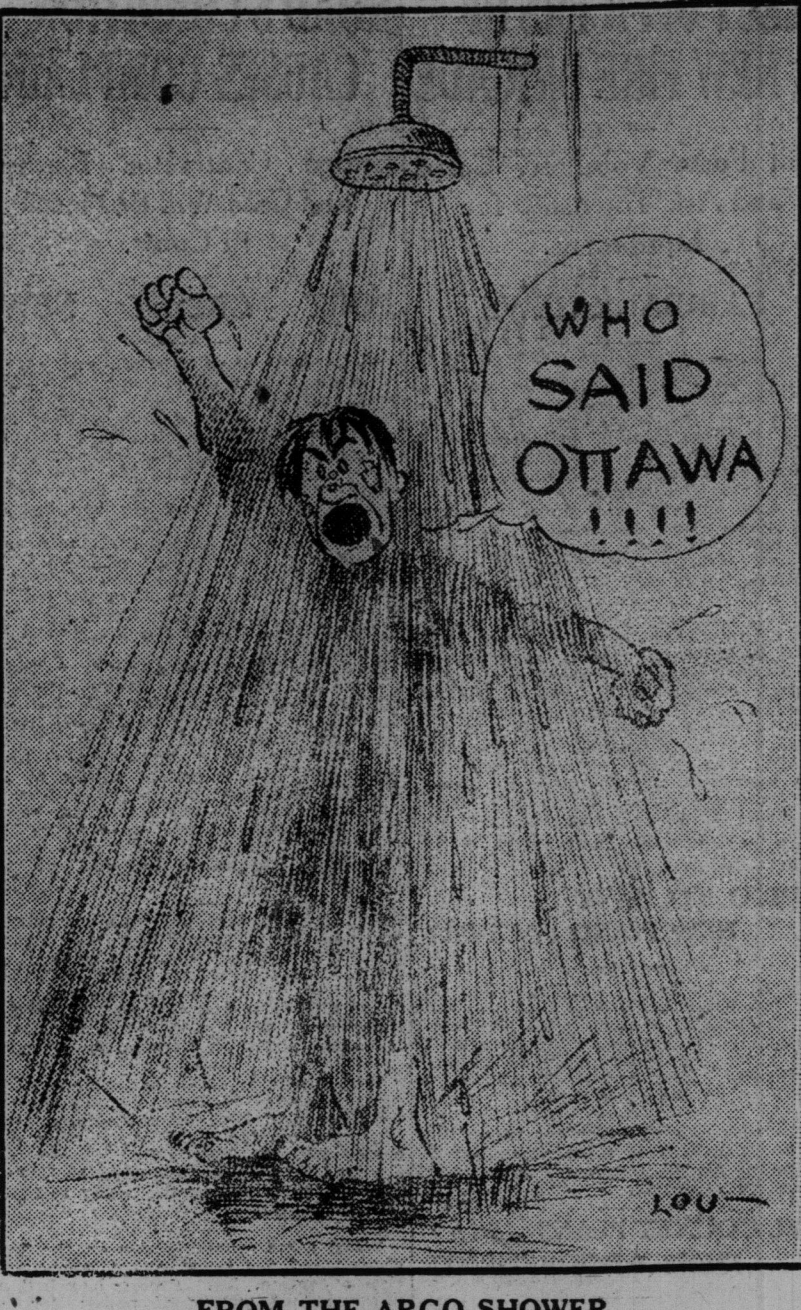
