REMENDOUS TORONTO A Centre Of Imperial Expansion

Abnormal Increases in Population and **Business Makes City** Government Spend Great Sums to Keep Up Pace and Prepare For What Next Five Years Will Hold-Many Millions For Constructive Improvements Will Keep Toronto Business On the Jump.

ORONTO has been hitting the high spots in the last five years, and she will be jumping along just as lively in the next five years. There are croakers who insist that Toronto is too big now for all purposes, and that anyone who expects the boundaries to be pushed out any farther is wild eyed. There will always be croakers and they will always be flies on the wheel. In the past five years, Toronto has been speeding on higher gear than was suspected of being in the mechanism of progress. It is only now that the civic government has caught up with the needs that grew out of the abnormal increase in population and business. And having caught up, there is so much more to attend to that a change to lower gear is impossible.

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Fifty Millions the Cost of Growth

PTTO GET a grasp on the pace Toronto has set to keep up with the progress of the whole Dominion, it has only to be

stated that the civic government had to borrow twenty-five millions of dollars last year, to meet the needs from abnormal development, and will have to borrow another twenty-five millions of dollars this year for the same reason. Fifty millions of additional debt in two years to keep up in the procession!

But the need for money this year may not stop at twenty-five millions. It is ninety-nine chances out of a hundred that the clean-up of the franchises will be consummated in a few months. That will necessitate borrowing eight more millions of dollars, the balance of thirty millions of purchase price being met by an issuance of bonds to the stockholders of the electric railway, light and power companies. The grand total of borrowings this year would then be thirty-three millions of dollars, and tifty-eight millions in two years.

City Will Keep Up the Pace

T T IS history how Toronto hit the high spots in the past five years. Why Toronto will keep up the lick in the next five years is a matter of easy deduction.

To begin with, Toronto cannot expend fifty

tions in the congested areas beyond the city's limits, and the officials of the township are quite willing to turn the responsibility over to the city by having the territory annexed to the city.

What We Must Do Right Away.

IN THE solving of the problem Toronto is not likely to take two bites at a cherry. The territory that will be annexed will

be wide-spreading enough to assure the 40mile boulevard drive, and to develop a couple of suburbs that will feed the Danforth avenue car line and Bloor street viaduct in the east, and the St. Clair avenue car line in the west. Then Toronto can grow as much as she likes for a few years, and the civic government will have

full control of the growth. Concurrent with the annexation of this wide-spreading territory will be the municipalization of the street railway system and the electric light and power competitors of the Hydro. Out into this wide-spreading territory will have to be extended the municipal street car and electric light and power systems. It will all be for the building of a greater Toronto. Best of all, the revenues from the railway and electric light and power systems will provide the money for extensions and new equipment, and Toronto will be moving on to a greater Toronto upon her own resources.

The Next Five Years

LL this will be going on in the next five years. Then, when those five busy years are over, the Welland Canal will have A been deepened, the Toronto harbor will have been made ready for a share of the inland merchant marine trade, and Toronto will commence to have big steel industries and all the auxiliary industries that are bound to follow. About that time Toronto will be racing towards the million mark in population.

The croakers who are now saying that To-ronto is too big for all purposes, will be wear-ing blue goggles in five years from now to withstand the glare of the limelight in which Toronto will be dancing along.
