CAID MACLEAN'S SUFFERING CHILLS

Recent Letters Show He is in Sorry Plight
LIVING ON MILK
As He is Afraid to Eat the Food Ratsull Sends in--

TANGIER, Sept. 7.—Recent letters received here from Caid Sir Harry MacLean, the Englishman who for many years has been in the service of the Sultan of Morocco, and who was captured early in July by the bandit Ratsull, complain that the said is suffering from chills as a result of sleeping on the floor with only a carpet for a covering.


TRYING TO RECRUIT IRISH CONSTABULARY
