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APPLICATIONS ARE ALL FILED

Safety Board Thus Disposes of Requests for More Pay—Ald. Kelley's Coasting Project.

At the regular meeting of the safety board last night Ald. Kelley introduced his resolution to have set aside certain hills in the city for coasting. It was carried. Chief Kerr submitted a request for an increase of salary which, however, was not acted on. Three other similar applications were filed for future reference.

Chief Kerr read a report of changes made by him in the department since the last meeting. Ald. Kelley referred to the case of John Brown, of No. 6 engine house, who he claimed, had been passed over when his time for promotion came, in favor of John Harnett. The chief maintained that all the changes had been made in the best interests of the department. The report was received and adopted.

The chief then read a petition asking for an increase in salary. He referred to the fact that he had been in the service twenty-six years. He asked, as his department is one of the most important in the city, whether he was not entitled to an increase. He did not wish for anything unreasonable. His present salary is \$1,200, of which he pays back more than \$300 in taxes.

Nothing was done and the next business was taken up. A number of bills for the services of the tug in connection with the water famine were passed to the treasury board.

Applications from W. D. McIntyre, assistant police officer, for an increase in his pay from \$80 to \$90 a month; from Chas. W. Piercy, engineer, for an increase of \$10 a month and from Joseph W. Green, superintendent of fire alarms, who wanted \$120 more a year were read.

The applications were filed. Police Sergeant Baxter was granted half pay for nineteen days while sick. Mrs. McLean applied for renewal of lease for a lot in Fairville. It was granted. John McDade asked for the lease of a lot in Carleton. It was referred to a committee to report.

William Downey, of the C. P. R., asked that a fire alarm indicator be installed and connected with their whistle in the power house in St. John west. On motion of Ald. Frink the director was instructed to

act with Chief Kerr and do the work.

The director then read a report in which he estimated the cost of repairing Carleton city hall at \$1,000 and \$8 engine house at \$400. He said he would not recommend spending any more money on the old engine house.

The report was received but no action taken.

Ald. Kelley then said he tried to get before the council during the afternoon a resolution to give the children a right to coast on certain hills in the city. As the board of safety has charge of the chief of police, under whose supervision the matter would be, he moved that the bill and by-laws committee be empowered to draft a bill to authorize Chief Clark to allow coasting at stated times and places.

Ald. Baskin said the resolution was creditable to the heart of the alderman if not to his judgment. He thought it would be a drastic thing to shut up certain streets in the city and interfere with the rights of the property holders of the streets.

Ald. Kelley in reply said that it would be only certain hours in the day, say for two or three hours in the afternoon and the police would be there to protect them.

Ald. Frink did not see any objection to send the bill to the legislature because if they did not see fit they would not pass it.

Ald. Holder said the police would protect the children but who would protect the pedestrians. Suppose a man was crossing the street and a sled ran into him and perhaps killed him, would not the city be liable?

Ald. Kelley in answer read the following provision from a draft act he had prepared:

The city of St. John shall not be liable for damages in law for anything done or for direct or consequential damages arising from setting apart hills for coasting in the city of St. John by the chief of police.

The city, he said, would not be liable for damages.

The question was then put and carried. Ald. McGowan said he noticed that some of the copper conductors on the library, as well as on the high school, were missing and had evidently been stolen.

Ald. Frink thought there must be a concerted crusade on copper conductors in St. John as they were missing from several buildings. It would do no harm for the chairman to call the attention of the chief of police to the matter.

Ald. Vanwart said he would do so and the discussion dropped.

Ald. Kelley then said he had spent some time looking into matters connected with the Marsh bridge abutment. As a result he had discovered that the provincial government had appointed a commission consisting of Councilors Donovan and ex-Ald.
