ARRIVAL OF THE MARCH MAIL.

The Hibernia, with the March mail, bringing intelligence one month later from England, arrived at Halifax on Friday morning last, in 14 1/2 days from Liverpool. She brought out 85 passengers, 67 of whom proceeded to Boston.

The British Government has borrowed eight millions sterling, to be appropriated for the relief of Ireland. Messrs. Baring and Messrs. Rothschild have taken the contract, the interest on which will amount to £280,000 per annum.

The English Flour Market has been in a very fluctuating condition since the departure of the previous steamer. The price of flour is now 10s. 6d. per bushel.

Large orders in hand from America, and others are expected to follow; the accounts lately received state that there had been much doing in English Woolens and Manufactured Goods at considerably increased prices; it remains to be seen how far the recently proposed increase of duty (should it be carried into effect) upon British goods, will check the demand for them.

The days of the present Parliament are numbered. All mooted points will be carefully avoided. The business of the session will be got through as speedily as possible, so as to get over the general election before harvest.

In the House of Commons, on the 2nd instant, Lord John Russell announced that her Majesty had been pleased to call a Council, to consider the best day on which to appoint a general fast and humiliation on account of the present awful condition of the sister kingdom. This announcement was received with evident satisfaction by both sides of the house.

It is reported among the military circles in Dublin, that His Royal Highness Prince George of Cambridge, K.G. and G.C.M.G., commanding the district, will shortly be appointed to a situation in the East India House.

On Saturday week a court of directors was held at the East India House, when Lieutenant-General Sir Willoughby Cotton, G.C.B., was sworn in commander-in-chief of the company's forces, and a member of council on the Bombay establishment.

In consequence of the high price of grain, the daily allowance of oats to cavalry horses has been reduced from ten pounds to seven pounds, which will save about 18,000 bushels of oats per annum in each regiment.

Death of Mr. Sharon Turner.—The celebrated author of the "History of the Anglo-Saxons" died early on the morning of the 18th inst. in his 72nd year. Mr. Turner was in the receipt of a pension of £300 a year, and the first volume of his "History of the Anglo-Saxons" was published in 1789.

Dr. Adair, the chief Rabbi of the Hebrews, has been recently introduced to her Majesty. He is about to institute schools connected with the various congregations of Jews in Great Britain.

Mr. Barry, the architect of the new Houses of Parliament, has intimated to the Marquis of Lansdowne that the House of Lords will be completed for the reception of their lordships after the Easter recess, with the exception of the fresco paintings and the statues in the niches.

MAJESTY AND THE QUEEN OF THE FRENCH.—Amongst the *ou d'ile* in Paris, it is said that her Majesty has written to the Queen of the French in the most friendly terms, expressing a desire to see the differences which have arisen between the two governments should not be allowed to make any change in the friendly relations existing between the royal families of the two countries.

The *Transatlantic Steam Ship*.—The new steamers of the British and North American Royal Mail Company, intended for the increased service between America and England, are to be called the *Transatlantic*, the *Canada*, the *Nagara*, and the *Europa*. These vessels are being forwarded with every dispatch consistent with that security and perfection which so eminently distinguish the fleet of the Royal Mail Company.

AMERICAN PINK TIMBER.—Of St. John, a cargo of 20 inches average was sold at 18s. per foot; of Quebec, one cargo was sold at 15s. per foot, and 200 square feet of the same quality at 11s. per foot. Red Pine—St. John at 14s. and 15s. per foot, with small sized White Pine at the same price. Birch—A parcel of Miramichi has been sold at 10s. per foot. The quantity sold on the 11th, per foot, was 200 square feet of Nova Scotia, by auction, at 20s. per foot.

His complaint is stated to be water on the chest, and dropsy in the legs, and symptoms ever at hand. The number of inquiries daily at his place is great, and it is said a servant from the palace is amongst the number. His span of life has already exceeded the three score and ten of the sacred volume; and the medical and physical year had tear he has undergone during the last forty years, shows that his constitution must have been originally hard as iron to resist the inroads of disease so long.
