New Dundee.—A small village about nine miles from Hamburg. Here we had a good meeting in the evening in the United Brethren church. The officers and ministers are very active men and push things. This is one of the most properous Branches in my field. The addresses were made in the two languages, English and German.

Berlin.—The meeting was held in the Lutheran church and was well attended; perhaps the largest ever held in Berlin. Addresses were made in the two languages. The collection amounted \$10.88. The depository is well kept and a case for the books will be provided. The Berlin Branch is going ahead.

## EXTRACTS FROM COLPORTEURS' REPORTS.

Mr. J. E. TAYLOR, — May, 1882.—I went from Collingwood to Parry Sound, which is about seventy miles, to see the Secretary of the Branch there, Mr. Ansley, to find out the best way of travelling through the Manitoulin Islands, Cockburn and St. Joseph Islands, and also the North shore from Killarney away to the West, and I am quite sure that the information he gave me will be of great help to me. Many thanks to the good brother for his kindness.

June .-- This has been a very hard month for me climbing the rocks and travelling through the bush. I have travelled through to Providence Bay, on a very rough road. I found six families on this road which is ten miles from Michael's Bay. The people are very poor in this part of the Island. I found them very much in need of Bibles, and very glad that the Bible Society had sent them such cheapones. One Indian came to me and wanted a New Testament in his own language; he had no money to buy it with, so I gave him one, which he was very thankful for. He said they had no such book as the New Testament where he lived. I trust that by this one other ones may be induced to read it and find the Lord Jesus. A Roman Catholic bought a Bible from me to learn more about the love of God in Jesus Christ. I next went to Mudge Bay, a very small place. I found the people very much in need of Bibles. Through this part of the island I got on Lake Kagawong, by this way up into Campbell, which you will see on reference to the map. There are not many people in this township as yet, and consequently there are no roads, only a trail through the bush. I went to see Lake and Gore Bay. This last is a very small place, and the people are very poor, but very wil-ling to purchase Bibles and Testaments for their children, as far as their means will allow them. I have sold 214 Bibles and Testaments this month. I have injured my foot by climbing the rocks, so that I am compelled to rest for a day or two.

July.—I have left the Manitoulin Island for the North shore of Algoma. My first visit was at Spanish River. I found about ten families at this place. They are Roman Catholics, about one half of them. Here I
