WOMEN AS BARRISTERS.

(Halifax Chronicle)

In moving the second reading of a bill to amend the Barristers and Solicitors Act, so as to permit women to practice at the bar of Nova Scotia, Mr. Finn said that he could not see why women should not be permitted. He thought that their advent to the bar would have a wholesome effect upon the males now practicing. He said that if Nova Scotia, Quebec and Prince Edward Island would then be the only provinces where women were not so permitted.

In our own province, said Mr. Finn, three young ladies were now studying law. One of these was a daughter of a member of the assembly for his own constituency. (Mr. Finn referred to a daughter of Hector McInnis, M. P. P.) Mr. Finn said that he understood that a large number of barristers of the province were opposed to this bill, and that they would have an opportunity of presenting their views when the bill came before the committee.

Whatever happened to the bill which proposed to give the vote to the women of the province, he did think that the house would be falling in its duty if it let the bill fall.

CARDINAL MERCIER HONOURED; ANOTHER SENT TO PRISON

Paris, March 25.—The Academy of Moral and Political Science yesterday awarded to Cardinal Mercier, primate of Belgium, its grand prize of 15,000 francs, destined to recompense the "most and greatest acts of devotion of whatever kind."

London, March 25.—Monsignor Louis Legras, vicar general to Cardinal Mercier, primate of Belgium, has been sentenced to nine months' imprisonment and deported to Germany for sheltering a discharged French soldier for one night, according to a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam.

This information is confirmed by a Reuters dispatch from Amsterdam which adds that Canon Allier, spiritual director of the great cemetery of Malines, of which Monsignor Legras was president, has been sentenced to eight months' imprisonment in Germany for giving shelter to another discharged French soldier.

LOCAL NEWS OF SOLDIERS

It is officially announced by the headquarters of the New Brunswick brigade, that Lieut. Charles P. Innes and Lieut. Walker, both of the 8th Canadian Garrison Artillery, have been appointed to the staff of the 25. 9 Overseas Siege Battery at Partridge Island. The two young men have already made a splendid record in the Canadian militia and besides being very popular with the men of their unit are well known and well liked by the officers. Lieut. Charles P. Innes is the son of Dr. P. R. Innes of this city and is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick. He is a gunner in the 8th Battery. He trained with the 1st Battalion of the 8th Canadian Garrison Artillery and would have accompanied it overseas had he not been appointed an officer in the 8th Canadian Garrison Artillery. At this time he was a corporal in the 8th Battery. In July of last year he came to the 8th Battery and has been serving at Partridge Island since then. He is a qualified artillery officer. Lieut. Innes is now absent in Halifax, where a physical training course at the R. S. A. there.

Lieut. Walker is the son of Colonel (Dr.) Thos. Walker of this city. He is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick and is qualified in heavy and siege artillery work. He has been with the 8th Canadian Garrison Artillery in the city of all ranks. Major P. W. Wetmore, O. C. of the No. 9 Heavy Siege Battery now has his establishment of officers completed and the big recruiting campaign to bring the battery up to full strength will be pushed to a successful conclusion as rapidly as possible. Enquiries are constantly coming in from all parts of the province as to the details of enlistment with the No. 9 Battery. The appeal seems to have taken hold with greater effect in the country districts of the province than in the larger centres of population. Several men are expected to report to the unit, for duty, this week from nearby country sections and the officers are most optimistic as to the outlook.
