BELIEVE THAT "MACK"

WILL GET RESULTS

Baseball Wizard Succeeding and

Likely to Have Team Worth

While Next Year

There is beginning to step into the

mind of many that one keen judge of

baseball talent on the hoof a dim and

hazy sort of notion that Connie Mack

may not after all be quite so far off in

his calculations as the relative standing

of his club might indicate. There is

developing a feeling that despite all pre-

sent appearances the lean leader of the

enfranchised White Elephant is really "get-

ting somewhere" and that in another

year he will have a ball club well worthy

of the name.

Back of very fair pitching they have

shown at least fair ability at bat and on

the bases, and only in isolated cases has

their fielding been especially ragged.

In short, they have been anything but

the sort of club which one would expect

to lose forty-one out of forty-three

games. Their work at times has been

coarse almost to the point of down-

right uncouthness and their inexperience

has been glaringly in evidence on more

than one play. But with all their faults

they have shown a very definite im-

provement over their form of a month

ago and look to be the sort of players

who would continue to improve.

Mack, however, has lost a 4 to 3 deci-

sion to two Yankee pitchers, will serve

as well as any other member of the

league, as an example of what can be

done with a ball player by an intelligent

manager who is willing to give the

player a thorough try-out. Just a

big, raw-boned kid with scarcely more

than a long and supple right arm to re-

ly his. Today, after a four months'

course in the school of applied

baseball science, Nabors is a pitcher

with whom few rival clubs care to take

very many liberties.

Other youngsters on the Philadelphia

roster have been only less conspicuously

successful than Nabors. Witt, for in-

stance, has become a fairly clever fielder

as well as a capable hitter in Mack's

hands. McElwain, at third, is a hard

hitter when he does connect and a shifty

base runner. Lundy, at second, is a

hard hitter and a shifty base runner.

Lundy does as well at second as Witt

and McElwain has done at short and

third respectively—unlike him, Lundy is

the finest natural ball player of the

three—Mack is likely to have a very fair

infant line-up in another year.

This being the case, Mack would seem

to be one pitcher, one relief catcher and

one or two really good players. He has

his club. He has his scouts, beating the

bushes for the missing links now and

then to secure something worth while

before he closes the current campaign.

If he does he will have accomplished

just what he set out to do and just what

90 per cent of the critics said he could

not do—reconstruct a ball club without

paying real money for any of the new

parts.

Kilbane and Welsh.

Johnny Kilbane has started light

training for his championship bout with

George Chaney of Baltimore, which is

to take place on Labor Day. The fea-

tureweight champion figures that he will

have no great trouble winning from

Chaney on points. At the same time,

he is leaving nothing undone to be in

the best shape possible. Chaney has a

dangerous wallop, but in Kilbane he

will meet the best defensive boxer among

the little fellows, and his chances of get-

ting over the laymaker are regarded as

slim.

Freddie Welsh has arrived at Colorado

Springs for his bout with Charley White

at that place on Labor Day. This is

another bout of the Kilbane-Chaney or-

der, a clever boxer opposing one who

trusts only in one powerful swing to

win for him. There appears to be as

little chance of Welsh losing to White

as there is of Kilbane losing to Chaney.

There is always a danger, of course, but

the odds are all against either cham-

pionship changing hands. Leonard or Dun-

dun would give Welsh far more trouble

over the twenty round route than

White is likely to cause. Having had

full opportunity to compare the two

lightweights, New Yorkers are not so

much excited over this match as might

be expected of a battle involving the

title in this popular division.

announced that he had been doing light

training for some time and might be

considered as a candidate to box Cham-

berlain Kilbane on Labor Day. How-

ever, the promoters were unable to settle
