Hints for the Cook

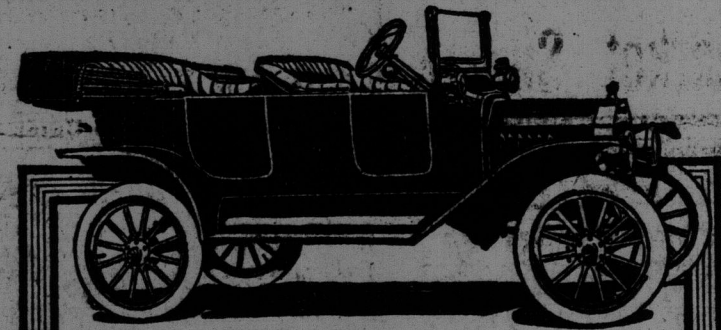
Cocoa Cake.
Put into your sieve 1 cup sugar, 1 1/2 cups flour, 2 level teaspoons baking powder, (or 1-2 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon cream of tartar), 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Sift all this into your mixing bowl. Break in 1 egg. Add 8 tablespoons melted butter, also 1/2 cup warm water (not boiling), and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat well. Bake rather slowly. Frost when cool with white frosting.

Fairy Pudding.
To half a tumbler of jelly add 1 cup

of hot water and boil till jelly is dissolved. Add 1 tablespoon cornstarch and pinch of salt mixed in cold water. Cook for ten minutes. When cold beat well and add the well beaten white of one egg and beat all together till nice and foamy. Put in mold on ice. Make a soft custard, sweetened, of yolk of the egg; pour around the pudding and serve.

UNDER COVER

Latest New York Success to Be Presented at Opera House

"Under Cover," the play that had a run of twenty-eight weeks in Boston last season and is now playing in New York to crowded houses, will be offered by Klark-Urban Company at the Opera House for four days commencing Monday. 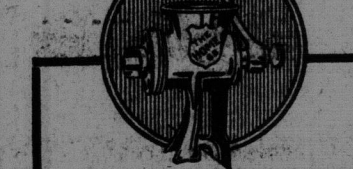

MAIL SACK CONTAINING \$14,000 IN CHECKS MISSING

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 25.—A mail sack shipped from Wenatchee, Wash., to Seattle, and said to contain checks amounting to \$14,000 and a large amount of cash has disappeared at Wenatchee.

The checks were in a remittance letter mailed by a Wenatchee bank to its Seattle correspondent. The amount of cash in the sack is said to have been more than \$1,000.

WHITE PLAGUE PRISONERS OF BELLIGERENT NATIONS SENT TO SWITZERLAND

Geneva, Sept. 25.—Consumptive prisoners to the number of 2,500, will soon arrive from belligerent countries for asylum and treatment in Switzerland under an agreement recently reached between the Swiss government and those of belligerent nations, providing for the care of invalid prisoners under Swiss guard at the expense of the belligerents.

The British section of the sick prisoners will be sent to various places in Oberland, the French to Leysin, and the Germans to St. Moritz.
