

# CITY SCHOOL HOLIDAYS TO END AUGUST 30

Nine Weeks' Vacation Determined on at Meeting of Trustees

## MATTER OF COUNTY GRANT UP AGAIN

### Vocational School and Kindergartens—Many Applications From Teachers

The city schools will close for the summer holidays on June 23 and will re-open for the fall term on Aug. 30. It was decided at the meeting of the Board of School Trustees last night that the closing date for the city schools is four days later than the date set officially for all the schools in the province, which is Aug. 25.

At the meeting Dr. S. A. Worrell, superintendent of city schools, was asked by the chairman, Dr. L. M. Curren, whether the pupils did continue in attendance when the school opening date was set for a day before Labor Day or whether they merely returned to enroll and then absented themselves from school until after the Labor Day holiday. Dr. Worrell replied that the majority of pupils continued in schools but that there might be a few who did not attend regularly until after the holiday.

Mr. Nagle did not favor opening before the Labor Day holiday and said that there was some general discussion of the matter and it was on the motion of W. C. Cross that it was decided to make the date of opening Monday, Aug. 30, which would give the city schools four days later than the date set officially for all the schools in the province.

Dr. Worrell explained that the teachers lost government grants when the schools opened later than the date set by the provincial authorities.

Dr. L. M. Curren, chairman, presided. Others present were: Mrs. E. H. Taylor, E. H. Carter, W. C. Cross, H. Colby Smith, E. R. W. Ingraham, S. W. Palmer, Thomas Smith and Dr. S. A. Worrell, superintendent of city schools, and A. Gordon Leavitt, chairman of the Board of School Trustees.

The possibility of closing one manual training class was spoken of and referred to the special committee which has the subject under consideration for a later report.

#### TERM EXPIRES

George P. Hennessey's term as supervisor for the board of construction of the Vocational School, was announced to have expired. The school is to be taken over on the expiration of the contract which has been fulfilled. It was stated that the Vocational School was not the size called for and in consequence was not large enough for desired forms of recreation.

The teachers wrote to thank the board for classes in manual training instruction which had been conducted by A. G. Ginter.

## CATHOLIC WOMEN'S LEAGUE REALIZES \$200,000 IN YEAR

\$5,250 Given to Sisters of Service; 15-Bed Hospital to Open Shortly

OTTAWA, June 14.—The Catholic Women's League realized \$200,000 during the past year, it was announced in the report of the treasurer, Miss Florence Roland, of Toronto, at the convention today.

The money was spent locally with the exception of \$10,000 which was devoted to national work.

Mrs. J. C. Keenan, of Toronto, presented the report of the Sisters of Service, dealing with the progress made in the fourth year of existence of this important branch of the work. Foundations of the order were now in Winnipeg, Norton, Edmonton, Vilna and Halifax.

The League had given the Sisters of Service \$5,250.40 in the past year. A hospital of 15 beds was being opened shortly, which would be the eighth foundation in four years.
