

## BOYS ON "BIKES" DECLARED TO BE ROAD MENACE

President of Auto Association Says Some Purposely Block Drivers

Referring to the accident of Wednesday, in which Mrs. William Fugley received severe injuries when she was forced to ditch her car in Rothney road in order to avoid striking a boy on a bicycle, T. P. Regan, president of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, said today that he and other officers of the association had received frequent complaints from members regarding the same conditions on several of the roads about the city.

### ANNOY AUTOBILISTS

On some occasions, he was informed, boys were in the habit of traveling along two or three abreast on their bicycles, and refused to take to their own side of the road when a car driver from behind sounded his horn. Some of these riders, it was charged, seemed to take a delight in keeping ahead of the cars and preventing them from passing, often times running for some distance in this position.

While many bicyclists using the road observed the law, there were many others who were not only breaking it, but taking a keen delight in doing so, Mr. Regan said. He expressed the opinion that, with the automobile drivers closely checked up by the traffic officers, some attention should be paid to the bicyclists, who evidently were one of the worst enemies to safe driving at the present time.

## GOV. CARLETON PICTURE GIFT TO LIBRARY HERE

Presentation Likely Next Week by Dr. J. C. Webster

The Saint John Public Library board has been notified by Dr. J. C. Webster of Shelburne, New Brunswick member of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada, that he, personally, is to present to the library a painting of Thomas Carleton, the first Governor of New Brunswick. The picture is a replica of the large one which Dr. Webster presented to the Provincial Government recently and which hangs in the province buildings at Fredericton.

### LIKELY NEXT WEEK

It is probable that the presentation to the library will probably be made next week. Dr. Webster has made numerous personal gifts for the public benefit during the last few years, including a monument to the town of Shediac in memory of the men from Shediac parish and vicinity who served in the Great War and a tablet on the Poch bridge over the Scoudou river at Shediac. He also was mainly instrumental in furthering the movement which resulted in the erection of a cairn in memory of Rt. Hon. Andrew Bonar Law at the late prime minister's birth place at Repton. He aided in the Grand Peace memorial movement and has made other gifts of a historic nature.

Jones, Conservatives, declared that he had, the latter saying McMillan had admitted it, but blamed it on the chief liberal whip. McMillan's claim was that the pair was to end when he got back to Ottawa without regard to whether or not Jones was back.
