President of Auto Association Says Some Purposely Block Drivers

Regan, president of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, said today that he and other officers of the association had received frequent complaints from members regarding the same conditions on several of the roads about the city.

GOV. CARLETON PICTURE GIFT TO LIBRARY HERE

Presentation Likely Next Week by Dr. J. C. Webster

The Saint John Public Library board has been notified by Dr. J. Clarence Webster of Shelburne, New Brunswick member of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada, that he, personally, is to present to the library a painting of Thomas Carleton, the first Governor of New Brunswick. The picture is a replica of the large one which Dr. Webster presented to the Provincial Government recently and which hangs in the province buildings at Fredericton.

LIKELY NEXT WEEK

It is probable that the presentation to the library will probably be made next week. Dr. Webster has made numerous personal gifts for the public benefit during the last few years, including a monument to the town of Shediac in memory of the men from Shediac parish and vicinity who served in the Great War and a tablet on the Poch bridge over the Scoudou river at Shediac. He also was mainly instrumental in furthering the movement which resulted in the erection of a cairn in memory of Rt. Hon. Andrew Bonar Law at the late prime minister's birth place at Reaton. He aided in the Grand Pre memorial movement and has made other gifts of a historic nature.
