

GREAT CROSSLEY MEETINGS OF '94 HERE RECALLED

Noted Evangelist Who Roused St. John, Coming Again.

Announcement of the coming of Dr. H. T. Crossley to the city will revive in many minds memories of one of the most remarkable religious movements in the history of St. John. In the early part of 1894 the Methodist churches of the city entered into negotiations with Evangelist Crossley and Hunter, two ministers of Canadian Methodism, who had entered into partnership in evangelistic effort, to come to the city, and after a period of preparation by the local churches these men began a campaign on Tuesday evening, February 13, 1894.

There is a very interesting story to be told regarding the relations of Rev. H. T. Crossley and J. E. Hunter in evangelistic work. It was impressed upon each of their hearts at the time that they were called to work of this kind and the letters which each wrote to the other suggesting that they join forces crossed in the mail. In this providential way there was begun a partnership which lasted for long years and resulted in great blessings to many

lives. Of the first meeting in St. John the Globe of Feb. 18, 1894, said: "Evangelists Crossley and Hunter held their first of many meetings in Centenary Church, Tuesday evening. The attendance was very large. The most of the Methodist clergymen were on the platform. The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. Hunter. A large number of hymns were sung by a united choir. Mr. Crossley, who is a very fine singer, sang several solos." From the first meeting the interest steadily increased until often the large auditorium of Centenary Church was filled at seven o'clock, and overflow meetings were sometimes necessary. The tabulated number of those who professed conversion was very large, and in all the churches there are to be found many men and women who began a new and better life under the preaching of these men. Mr. Hunter was the magnetic partner in the team, whose power of decisive appeal for decision was used of God in a wonderful way. Mr. Crossley was the philosopher and practical man, whose tenderness of spirit and force of reasoning gave to his preaching a marvelous charm.

Some time ago Mr. Hunter, through ill health, was forced to seek retirement, but even then his zeal never wavered and more than once he was heard to put forth the claim that, in the long days when he sat in obscurity as an invalid and did nothing but pray, he was then accomplishing as much as in the days of his active evangelism. A few years ago he entered upon higher service before God's face and leaves a devoted minister of the Methodist Church, and is possessed of much of the evangelist's fervor of his father.

Mr. Crossley was not a very young man when he was in St. John 28 years ago, but by specializing in physical culture methods he has retained his

youthfulness to a marked degree. During all his campaigns he gives a special lecture on "Nature's Secret of Health, Efficiency and Long Life." On his way to St. John he will be in Belleville, Ontario, to give the lecture before the students of the college there. He is now known as Rev. H. T. Crossley, D. D., and has associated with him J. H. Leonard, singing evangelist. All the reports which come to hand tell of great results wherever they have labored. A few weeks ago a series of meetings was conducted by these leaders in Kincardine, and a correspondent writes: "Kincardine has just closed a series of services in which the venerable Dr. Crossley and his talented singer, Mr. Leonard, took a prominent part. The messages of Dr. Crossley were powerful, full and persuasive and night after night conversions were recorded. The meetings grew from the first and the churches in the town have been enriched by the ministry of these Godly men."

Five St. John churches are uniting in the campaign, which will open in Exmouth Street Methodist Church, on Sunday—Waterloo St. Baptist, Zion Methodist, Coburg Street Christian, Tabernacle Baptist, and Exmouth Street Methodist. Committees have been formed covering all details of the campaign.

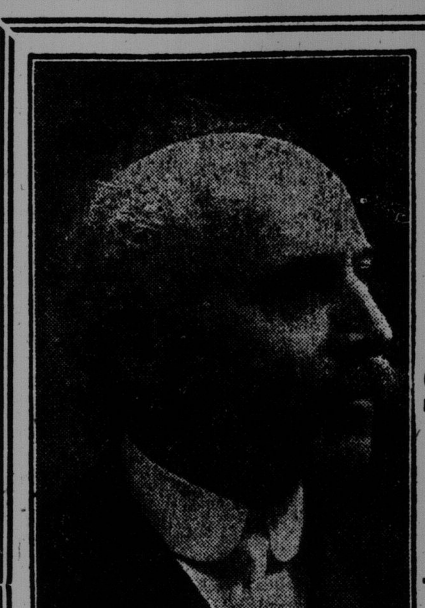

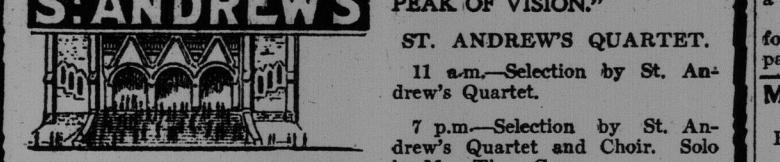
