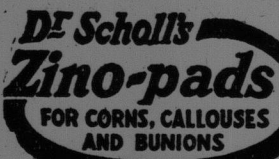

MAKING MONTREAL A SINGING CITY

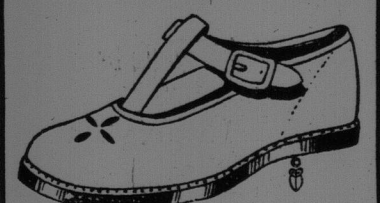
Nearly Eight Thousand on Fletcher's Field Join in Choruses With Kiwanis Club.

With warm weather to drive people out of doors, plus the attraction of the community singing programme offered by the Kiwanis Club, Fletcher's Field last night was covered by a crowd which was estimated at between seven and eight thousand persons, and the evening's entertainment was said by club members to have been the most successful of the present season. It was pointed out that the audiences had been growing each week, the previous week's attendance being registered at 5,000, so that last night's crowd was two or three thousand more.

The weather was ideal, the crowds having all dispersed before the rain came. The field presented an animated scene and was in many crowds comparable to the celebrated crowds which revel during the summer months on Hampstead Heath in England and, as one Kiwanian remarked, if the cockney dialect was absent, multifarious feathers and buttons which Dame Fashion decreed this season, were everywhere in abundance adorning whims of feminine attire. The crowd scattered all about the fields, but the vicinity of Jacques Cartier monument was particularly dense with happy kiddies all during the singing.

The Kiwanians, as usual, gathered in the bandstand, which affords an excellent centre for announcements and for the members to lead the singing with the aid of megaphones which projected from all around the railings. Two kindly, but stalwart policemen had a difficult task in keeping the youngsters from climbing over the rails or up the stairs. It was a pleasing sight to see quite small children turning up the number of the current song and aiding an even smaller companion to follow the words. It mattered not whether a song was old or new so long as it was popular, and the selections sung comprised examples from every field of vocal scores. Such numbers as "My Mammy" and "The Sheik" proved to be great favorites, and some attractive effects were occasioned by the singing of "The Sun Shines East, The Sun Shines West," for

One Kiwanian declared that there was a time when in the evening he would bemoan the fact that he was one of Canada's tired business men, but now he had no time for such foolish thoughts, since he now sang until all the tunes which, being taught and introduced on Fletcher's Field, were fast making Montreal a singing city. Mr. E. Kerr was the accompanist and Mr. Jack Harrison made the announcements, while Mr. V. Loftus sang solo, the chorus of which was taken up by the crowd.

LOCAL NEWS

Thomas Nagle has been appointed vice-consul of the Netherlands at St. John for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

The sum of \$110 has been donated from M. R. A. Ltd., and interested employees for furnishing the Red Cross Recreational Hut at Lunenburg. In the war fifteen members of the M. R. A. staff enlisted.

Adrian B. Gilbert, M. A., arrived in the city on Saturday from Quebec, having returned from England on the Mehta. Mr. Gilbert has been attending the Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar from the University of New Brunswick and completed his course in law there this year. He graduated from U. N. B. in 1916 and took up his residence at Oxford in 1919, after he had served two years with the C. E. F.

A telegram to the local police from Sheriff F. N. Hughes saying that Daniel O'Brien and George Essory had escaped from the Charlottetown jail while awaiting transfer to Dorchester penitentiary was followed on Saturday by news that O'Brien had been arrested near Moncton on suspicion of being concerned in a burglary and to explain his possession of a car he was driving. He will be given a hearing in the Moncton police court today.

Ernest Shipman, motion picture producer of Ottawa, was a week-end visitor to the city and while here expressed the opinion that St. John with its beautiful scenic surroundings and historical connections should have a company organized for the production of motion pictures. He believed that such a concern would be very profitable financially and also would serve as an excellent advertisement for securing desirable immigration.

The boy scouts of the First Presbyterian church have been camping since July 7 on the shore at Taylor's Beach, about six miles down the bay. Many visitors were at the camp yesterday. The boys were put through military drill and acquitted themselves very creditably. In the afternoon Rev. Dr. J. A. Morrison, chaplain of the troop, gave an address on different types of heroes and what types boys admired.

TO NEW YORK FOR BIG LOAN

Vancouver, B. C., July 17.—J. C. DeGarriss, one of the best known men in Australia, is in Vancouver en route to New York, where he hopes to negotiate a big loan for the furtherance of his irrigation scheme at Kenendup, Western Australia. He is also negotiating with U. S. interests for the disposal of the world's patent rights on a new metallic contact process for the extraction of copper and gold from crude ores. He believes it will revolutionize the copper industry, enabling the extraction of the metal at a very low cost.
