"Ernie" Sterling, the physical director of the Y. M. C. I., is very enthusiastic over the prospects of an unusually good meet. Entries for the several events close today. Cups will be presented to the winners of first and second places in each event.

CASE IS ADJUDICATED.
 Quebec, Feb. 15—Under the new works or incinerator departments, and their employees. If any employees go on strike before the dispute has been adjudicated on by the arbitration board they will be liable to a fine of from \$10 to \$100 a day, while if any municipal

corporation declares a lockout in similar cases, they will be fined from \$100 to \$1,000 a day. There is no provision for compulsory acceptance of the award of the arbitration board, as it is felt that public opinion will force the parties to accept such decisions.
