## ET MILLIONS IN GOLD FROM SUNKEN LAURENTIC

Burnsara, Ireland, Aug. 15—Gold imports to the value of £1,000,000 sterling have been recovered by salvagers from the wreck of the former White Star Dominion liner, *Laurentic*, which was sunk on Jan. 28, 1917, off Fasad Light.

The *Laurentic*, a vessel of 14,892 tons, which was acting as a British auxiliary cruiser, struck a mine off the north coast of Ireland. Of a personnel of 470, only 120 were saved. According to the testimony of Captain Norton before a coroner's hearing a large number of the men perished in open boats as a result of the bitter weather then prevailing.

## BELGIANS AND DUTCH FIRM IN POSITIONS TAKEN

Matter of the River Scheldt and the Cession of Territory, However, May be Compromised

Paris, Aug. 15.—(By the A. P.)—The Belgian delegates finished the presentation of their case before the commission which is considering Belgium's demands for a revision of the treaty of 1839. The Dutch representatives are to be heard on the subject. In the meantime the commission will take a recess. Although nothing has transpired thus far concerning possible concessions by either Belgium or Holland, it can be said on good authority that the Belgians still are firm in their demands for a new regime for the Scheldt River and are likely to remain intransigent on that point, even if later they may be disposed to modify their territorial demands.

The Dutch view is understood to be unchanged regarding the Scheldt, which they are willing to be free for navigation in times of peace only. They insist that they cannot consider any revision of the treaty involving modification of territorial boundaries.

The final issue probably will come with the Belgians stoutly maintaining their demand for the opening of the Scheldt and the Dutch refusing any cessation of territory. A compromise between these two viewpoints, however, is considered probable.

## MONCTON MAN HEAD OF I.O.O.F.

P. A. MacGowan Chosen Grand Master—Next Year's Meeting in Sackville

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 15.—The I. O. O. F. grand lodge of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland held its closing session last night after electing P. A. MacGowan of Moncton, grand master and selecting Sackville, N. B. as the place of meeting in 1920. The officers elected are:

The report on the state of the order was submitted by Dougald Stewart. It dealt with the progress of the order the outlook for the future and suggested to the newly elected grand master that his watchword for the year be an increase of 1,000 in the membership. The report of the committee on finance showed total receipts for grand lodge purposes for the last year to be \$14,366.02 and expenditure \$15,181.77. The total balance to the credit of the grand lodge on July 24, 1919 was \$8,662.59. The assets of the grand lodge were shown to be \$9,750.17. The estimated receipts for the coming year were placed at \$13,928.40 and estimated expenditure \$11,060.00.

The amount to the credit of the Odd-fellows' home fund is \$19,606.48. Consideration of committee reports took up the time of the afternoon session and at the closing session last night the officers were installed and place of meeting decided.
