



I have never been able to see the need of our being afraid of Germany. Even had we been compelled to meet her single-handed, I still do not see the possibility of her having been able to break down our fleet. On the contrary, the overwhelming probability is that we should have accomplished on the sea precisely what we have done. Under recent conditions, though the war may be long and terrible, it is inconceivable that it can have any other termination than the utter collapse of the German Empire, in its present form. The bogey of her almost superhuman powers, preached to us by our jingo politicians for their own ends, has already been laid. Her superhuman cunning—also preached to us for the same purpose—turns out to have had even less foundation. It is almost pathetic to read the record of her amazing stupidity.

Europe's Stage Villain. Their methods have been those of the Stage Villain. For the last ten years they have been discussing their precious plots at the top of their voices, with all Europe listening and taking notes. Germany, Austria and Italy were to suddenly fall upon France and Russia and finish them off before the rest of the world had time to put on its clothes. Even for this simple and childlike plan two things were essential. One was that a Russian revolution should paralyze the Russian armies. So what do they do? They choose for their cause the one thing—perhaps the only thing—capable of welding the entire Russian people into one enthusiastic whole: the cause of Teuton against Slav.

The second was the non-intervention of England. One can only suppose that for the last seven or eight years they have been reading the English Tory Press, and have convinced themselves that God was working with them by having handed over the destinies of England to a government of scamps and traitors. Reading the state venom poured out daily in connection with the Marconi business, they may possibly have come to the conclusion that there was not a man in the English cabinet who could not be squared for a few thousand marks. They read in the Unionist Press that Ireland hated England, and was only waiting an opportunity to stab her in the back. In company with some others, they were silly enough to believe it.

India was on the verge of revolt. At one time this might have been a danger. Lord Curzon's firm insistence that natives should be treated with justice averted this. Our white men and our brown men are now fighting side by side for England's cause. In future there must be no foolish arrogance. English gentlemen and native gentlemen will share the same railway carriage. The native will walk into the presence of the Sahib and the Menu-sahib upright as a man, and with his boots on. the German people. We will meet them with their own weapons, and we will conquer them. When we have driven out of them their foolish boasting and their foolish pride, we will make a peace with them.

Germany has sinned, and Germany will pay the price of her sin. The history of the nations is not such that any

one of us can raise up Pharisaical hands and thank God that we are not as others. To talk as if the German people were all monsters who must never be forgiven, is to talk the language of an hysterical school boy. For many centuries France was our enemy. If some of our brave journalists would only read history! Let them turn up our cartoons, our speeches and writings during the period of the Napoleonic wars. Napoleon was anti-Christ. Attila, the Hun, was a Christian gentleman compared with him according to our then estimate. Our fear of him passed away. No longer is his name used to frighten our naughty children. Today we write sympathetically of him—grasp the fact that he had his purpose in the world. I venture to quote one of his wise sayings: It runs: "Holding hatred; hear both sides, and delay judgment until reason has had time to resume her sway."

Today the hatred of a thousand years is buried. We are fighting side by side with France. Jacques is no longer a frog-eating monster, but our brave brother. We have found him after all these years. So in time we shall find that they were all our brothers, Teuton and Slav, brown man and yellow man, and black man. The time may be far off. Meanwhile, we will keep the bridges open.

The English Character.

We will not listen to the counsels of hatred. All that is best in England is

standing for that. King George visits the hospitals, speaks kind words to the wounded. And not only to the English wounded. His words of sympathy and hope for shattered Hans and Fritz.

We trust our gutter journalists are not going to foul their mouths with abuse of the King for behaving in this "un-English" fashion. I fancy some of our strident journalists have not quite got the hang yet of the English character. A little more experience as Englishmen may perhaps help them. We hear of the insults offered to English people escaping Germans to return to Germany. The Russians are sending donations to the German Red Cross Society. Two Frenchmen fighting to the bitter end were surrounded by Germans. The German commander signs to them to keep their arms and then asks permission to shake hands with them both. French soldiers persist at great personal risk to live, in capturing a gallant Uhlán alive. He has fought like a lion. They press

round him, shake him by the hand. There is a base section of the English Press that is furious at the mere suggestion that England also should give vent to any chivalrous sentiment.

For the atrocities that war brings in its wake let us keep our indignation hot. But let it be the indignation of just men. Let us be willing to listen, to weigh evidence. Lord Selborne makes the admirable suggestion that all these stories of horror should be sifted by some legal tribunal of a neutral state, so that their truth or falsehood may be proved. Some of them are so unsuited that I make no excuse for doubting them. To accept them readily would be to insult human nature. That a few may be true is, also, possible enough. If a fiend lurks within a man, war may be trusted to discover it. The history of the Peninsular War is not pleasant reading. Men are burned alive, not only in war time, and not only by Germans—presuming German soldiers to have done this. Let all these accusations be proved. If they are true, the criminals must be punished. That should be made a condition of peace. If they are not true, those who have invented them deserve to be shot.

Alleged Atrocities.

A recent ghastly and detailed account of outrage to a Red Cross nurse we now find to be a "practical joke." It is a joke that leaves a smirch on England's name. Stories of German officers cutting off women's breasts in sight of English soldiers call for corroboration. I have spent some time in Belgium. For their many virtues I respect the Belgians, but no nation is entirely free of faults. I have seen many men and women suffering from cruel wrong, maddened by the sights of war, but not sufficient evidence, in which I believe, to condemn a whole nation. I am sure

stress of excitement, even educated, truthful people can be led away by their imagination we have proved in the recent stories about tens of thousands of Russians having passed through England. People saw them, spoke to them. I found I was giving personal offence to friends of my own by throwing doubt upon their statements. The thing was vouched for by men of unimpeachable honor. In spite of common sense, I began to think there must be truth in it.

Precisely a century ago—next year, we, with the help of France and Germany, finally defeated Napoleon. We gave back France to the French; we vineyards, and her corn lands and her fair cities. And France, her spirit unconquered, took her place once more among the nations and gave of her virtues and her genius to the common good. Today we, with the help of France and Russia, are fighting the war lords of Germany. We will conquer them. We will—if the German people have not themselves by that time saved us the trouble—deprive them of all power of evil. And then we will give back Germany to the sober, patient German people. And, purified by fire and made strong through much suffering, they shall build up a new Germany. And we will be brothers.
