ROBLIN'S SAVAGE ATTACK ON REV. MR. GORDON IN HOUSE

Winnipeg, Jan. 15.—In his speech in the legislature yesterday on the MacDonald bye-election, Premier Roblin referred to Rev. Charles W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) whom he described as a "political parson."

He declared that a parson who descended from the pulpit to mix up in party politics deserved all he got. Speaking of the resolutions condemning the MacDonald election methods passed by the Presbyterian Synod at Brandon, he declared they had been "introduced by the machinations of a designing political parson who condoned and approved of this (Liberal) desecration."

"I repeat that the resolution was engineered by Rev. Gordon to humiliate and injure the government of this province."

The premier termed Mr. L. Richardson, the defeated candidate in MacDonald, "the essence of irresponsible political expediency."

FINAL STAGES OF HOME RULE BILL

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
