Liverpool, Nov. 28.—John Rogers & Co. today states that prices quoted on Saturday were maintained in Birkenhead, but the trade was very slow and dragging. There was a surfeit of rough beef and the price of this may come lower. Quotations are:—States steers, from 12 1/4 to 13 1/4 cents; Canadian from 11 1/2 to 12 1/4 cents; and ranchers, from 10 to 11 1/2 cents a pound.

## RUBBER TIRE MEN PICK ST. JOHN AS MARITIME HEADQUARTERS

Big Concern Sees Importance of This City as Distributing Centre—Officials Here Today

St. John is to be made the headquarters for the marketing provinces of the Good Year Tire & Rubber Co. of Canada, Ltd., and a branch office and warehouse will be established here in the near future. This is another indication of the growing importance of St. John as a distributing centre in the eyes of the business men of Canada.

L. C. Van Bever, vice president of the company, of Toronto, and F. D. Saylor, manager of the mechanical goods department are in the city today looking over the ground with the view of deciding on a suitable location for the St. John branch.

The head office of the Good Year Company is at Akron, Ohio, which is the centre of the rubber manufacturing industry in the United States. They also have a sub-factory in Canada, but, until now, have a capacity to make tires to accommodate all the cars in Canada. Deciding to add mechanical goods to the other lines the company bought out the Durham Rubber Co., paying therefor about a third of a million dollars. With the lines they are adding Mr. Van Bever says they will have the largest exclusive rubber company in Canada. They have contracts for auto tires aggregating half a million dollars from the McLaughlin Motor Co., the Canada Cycle & Motor Co., the E. M. F. Co., Dominion Motor Co., Tuttle Motor Co., and others. The general offices of the company are in Toronto and the president is Mr. Seiberling. The secretary is C. H. Carlyle, formerly of Akron, but now of Toronto.

The output of the company to manufacturers alone, from January to May last year was \$10,000,000 of tires. The factory at Akron has a capacity of turning out 2,000 tires a day at an average cost of \$5 a tire. It has been necessary for the employees to work 20 hours a day lately in order to keep up with the demand.

Speaking of the establishment of a branch in St. John, Mr. Van Bever said that business for eastern Canada would be taken care of in this office and it would be in charge of local men, but he was not prepared to announce at present who the men would be. The company now have branches in Toronto, Montreal, Winnipeg, Vancouver and Seattle. It will be opened in Calgary at the same time as the St. John branch is started.

Mr. Van Bever will leave this evening on his return to Toronto but will come back soon to complete arrangements for the opening of the branch here.

## FAREWELL SERMON

Rev. Mr. Bishop will continue to reside in Fairville and it is possible that later he will arrange for an office in the city. Arrangements have not been completed for a successor to Mr. Bishop. Next Sunday Rev. Harry Boyer of the New Brunswick Theological Seminary will occupy the pulpit.
