This division of the studies into two distinct courses affords many real advantages, as the Seminary has long since experienced in the happy results obtained. Hence, it is not surprising that the house is rapidly winning a well merited reputation throughout Canada and the United States, from many points of which it has received flattering marks of approval, at the hands of appreciative judges.

Foremost among its advantages, may be reckoned the Seminary's capacity to educate in the true Christian sense of the term—to educate the heart as well as the mind of the pupil, by combining sound religious instruction with a solid, practical, worldly training.

Should circumstances oblige a pupil to discontinue his studies after one or two years, the knowledge he will then have acquired will have so notably improved him as to render him immediately useful.

COMMERCIAL COURSE.

The Commercial Course covers three years. It embraces the study of French, English, Mathematics, Book-keeping, Letter-writing, History, Geography, etc., in a word all that is required to fit the young man for commerce and industry.

Special classes of Mathematics, Penmanship, Shorthand and Vocal Music, which form no extra charge, are left to the option of the pupil.

A Preparatory class fits for the Commercial Course students as yet not sufficiently advanced.

Two features deserving of special notice are: first, that the study of English is placed on absolutely the same footing as that of French; second, that a very particular attention is given to Arithmetic and accounts. Nothing is neglected to insure the success of these two prominent features.
