A MAN FELL FROM 20 FEET FROM A BUILDING - Yesterday afternoon, about half past 2 o'clock, a young man named Frank Murphy, while at work on the rear of Maple Row, near building, Water Street, fell from the scaffolding upon the wharf, a distance of some 20 feet, striking on the left shoulder and side of the head. Mr. Mooney, mason, and J. H. Wetmore, joiner, were a short distance from the spot at the time, and upon raising him found him stiff and unconscious; he had his mouth full of nails, and was bleeding freely from the cuts received from them. Dr. Berryman and Dr. Allison were immediately summoned, but it was found that the upper portion of the spine had been dislocated, and as soon as possible he was conveyed to the General Hospital. At the time of the accident Murphy was sitting astride on one of the "jiggers" or horizontal beams connecting the poles of the scaffolding, nailing some upright boards which were to serve as a shield in building when the material to the top of the building, when he overbalanced himself and fell. It is stated that only about 20 minutes before he came near falling from an even higher elevation. The unfortunate man was unmarried and resided with his mother at the lower Cove.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION. TILDEN ELECTED. The St. John Election, &c.

[Special to The Evening Advertiser.] ST. JOHN, Nov. 8th '76.

A great deal of interest is manifested here in the Presidential elections in the United States, which came off yesterday.

It was announced quite early last evening that New York City had given Tilden 55,000 majority, but it was claimed by Republican sympathizers that the large vote outside of the City would be so large as to give a Republican majority of about twenty thousand for the whole State.

It turns out, however, that the State gives Tilden about 25,000 majority.

The Republicans had counted on South Carolina, Wisconsin, West Virginia, New York, Connecticut, California, New Jersey, and Oregon. They are known now to have carried Colorado with three electoral College votes; Illinois, with twenty-two; Minnesota, three; Iowa, eleven; Kansas, five; Maine, seven; Massachusetts, thirty-two; Delaware, three; Vermont, five. The following States, with their electoral votes, are known to have gone Democratic: - Alabama, ten; Arkansas, eight; Connecticut, six; Florida, four; Georgia, eleven; Indiana, fifteen; Kentucky, twelve; Louisiana, eight; Maryland, eight; Mississippi, eight; Missouri, fifteen; New York, thirty-five; New Jersey, nine; Oregon, three; Texas, eight; Tennessee, twelve; Virginia, seven; West Virginia, five; North Carolina, ten; South Carolina, seven; Wisconsin, ten; California, ten; making a total of 174 electoral votes.

Fire in the Newcastle Custom House. Our Newcastle correspondent sends us the following: -

NEWCASTLE, Wednesday Morning. This morning, about two o'clock, the Custom House was discovered to be on fire. The fire is supposed to have originated in the back office, near the coal bin, as the woodwork of that part of the building was entirely destroyed. Creeping up the walls it burned a hole in the roof, extending from the ridge pole to the roof, and about three feet wide. The front office were damaged with water, the fire doing little damage, being confined to the rear.

The whole inside of the building and roof will have to be rebuilt. All the books and papers, with the exception of a few blanks, have been saved. Loss about \$500.

How the fire caught is a mystery, as there was no stove within ten feet of where the fire is supposed to have commenced, and the Collector informed us that the fire in the stove was out before he left the office the evening before.

The Salmon-Breeding Establishment on the Northwest Miramichi. A large quantity of salmon-ova has been successfully laid down at the Dominion Government hatching establishment on the Northwest Miramichi River. Last year the reception and hatching of the ova were both improved and after they were examined by Inspector Venning, the work of making repairs was entrusted to Mr. Elson Tozer who, under the Inspector's personal direction, has made a satisfactory job, both dams being now staunch and tight and full of water.

The burglar fired again, the ball passing through Schramm's cap without doing him injury. Schramm fired again and hit the burglar, wounding him badly. He fell to the floor. The other burglar then took the wounded one and dragged him out of the house.

THE WAR IN THE EAST. Particulars of the battle between the Turks and the Servians on Oct. 22nd, 1876. The Servian artillery, opened at Tchernoyeff's depository manner refused to fight, and abandoned their position despite the efforts of the Russian army.
