ROOSEVELT COMPARED TO CHRIST.

DENVER, Col., Aug. 9.—"The one man of the world who matches Jesus man in earnestness of purpose, in purity of life, is the President of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt." The above extract from an address by the Rev. Frank W. Gunsaulus, of Chicago, at Trinity Methodist Church last night has caused great surprise among laymen. The clergy look on it as "blasphemy," "the rankest absurdity" and "harmless gush."

AMERICAN, FRENCH AND JAPANESE WARSHIPS IN BRITAIN'S STRONGHOLD.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—King Edward will today review the combined French and British squadrons off Dover, and afterwards the French squadron will enter Portsmouth harbor. With the exception of the visit of an American squadron two years ago, this will be the only foreign fleet that has ever entered Great Britain's most jealously guarded naval arsenal, and for this reason the event will be the most significant feature of the French squadron's visit.
