

CARSON FLOOD WAS SHOT IN THE HAND Careless Handling of Revolver

Occurred at Westfield This

The careless handling of a revolver was the cause of Carson Flood. aged 15 years, and son of G. Herbert Flood, being severely injured this morning about 10 o'clock. For some days a number of young fellows, including Carson Flood, have been enjoying their vacation at the Holden camp, near "Nat" Belyea's, on the main river. Among the many modes of enjoyment the youths carry revolvers and are well supplied with contriders and they have found among the same and they have s

This morning young Flood, with a few companions, were engaged in fitting out a pleasure craft called the Rosamond.
