MONKS IN FIERCE FIGHT
WITH BOLD BRIGANDES

Rifles Successfully Used in Defending
Monastery Against a Midnight
Raid.

ROME, Nov. 6.—A desperate battle between monks and brigands has taken place at the Abbey of the Holy Ghost, at Santo Spirito, Sicily.

The monastery is one of the richest on the island, and possesses an almost priceless collection of ancient chaises and other sacred vessels, as well as vestments and a jeweled processional cross of great value.

The brigands determined to raid the monastery and murder the monks if they resisted. They accordingly rode up to the main entrance late one night and demanded admittance.

When this was refused they commenced operations by breaking a hole in the wall.

The monks were roused from their slumbers and ran to the spot armed with rifles. Shots were exchanged, and two bullets passed through the habit of one of the defenders. The monks returned the brigands' fire briskly, and two of the latter were severely wounded.

During the fight the abbot, crucifix in hand, directed the defense. Meanwhile the brigands hurried to the bell and sounded the alarm. The peasants were soon flocking to the monastery from all sides, thinking the buildings were on fire.

The brigands finally escaped in the darkness, leaving their wounded behind. The latter were cared for and then handed over to the authorities.

ARCHBISHOP MOBBED
AND PALACE BESIEGED

His Declaration That Civil Marriage is
Legalized Immorality Resented
by Peasants.

MADRID, Nov. 6.—The anti-clerical agitation throughout Spain is becoming more acute, and the authorities have summoned the Archbishop of Valencia to Madrid to avoid hostile demonstrations in his own diocese.

The archbishop, who recently declared that civil marriage was legalized immorality, was mobbed by a mob at Alcoy during a pastoral visit. Large numbers of persons who had been married in this manner had been gathered outside the archbishop's palace at Valencia and shouted "Death to the Archbishop!"

The Council of Ministers yesterday approved fifteen articles of the new law regulating religious associations, and the rest were adopted today. The minister of foreign affairs will send a draft of the new law to the Vatican tomorrow, giving notice of its approval by the government.

Three thousand tobacco workers in a local factory organized a serious riot yesterday because of the rumor that the company employing them had given a community of nuns an order for the manufacture of a large quantity of cigarettes.

A great Republican mass meeting will be held here next Sunday to protest against the attitude of the bishops regarding the proposed religious reforms.

CONFESSES CRIME FOR
WHICH ANOTHER SUFFERS

Australian Baker Admits Murder of Mrs.

Gordon, Whose Husband is Now
Under Arrest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Unable to eat or sleep under the prickings of his conscience, he declared, John Wachine, 23 years old, an Australian baker, last night confessed to Coroner Julius Harburger, according to a statement made by the coroner, that he was the murderer of Mrs. Maggie Gordon, 22 years old, who was choked to death at her home on Second street Sunday last.

The woman's common law husband, Alexander Gordon, had been arrested in connection with the murder and was committed to the Tombs prison to await an inquest.

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
