## WILL CONTINUE CASE AGAINST THE SPANISH COUNTESS.

BERLIN, Aug. 10.—And now it is announced that the public prosecutor will carry the famous Princess Wrede case through to the higher courts. If this is actually done it will be only another illustration that the law's delays are universal, and apply in Germany as well as in other countries of the world. The case is the outgrowth of the proceedings against Princess Wrede who was charged with a series of thefts from hotels where she has been staying. The lady in question who is fifty years of age, belongs to an aristocratic Spanish family and was born in Buenos Ayres. Married while she was still only a girl to a prominent Argentine official, she found herself at an early age a widow with a fortune of \$75,000 a year. It was then that she met a grandson of Field Marshal Prince Wrede, the hapless Bavarian general who met a futile attempt to block Napoleon's road to France at Hanau after the battle of Leipzig. Some years ago the Princess was a conspicuous figure in German society, but latterly she has lived apart from the world in seclusion with her husband, Prince Wrede, and a lady companion named Wedig. Early last year the Prince had occasion to dine at a well-known hotel in consequence of his conduct towards the Frauellen Wedig. The man thereupon threatened to accuse his mistress of theft if his money was not given to him, but the Prince did not allow himself to be intimidated, and at once gave the man a good cuff for blackmail. For this offence the Prince was sentenced to nine months imprisonment, but the public prosecutor, none the less obliged to act upon the information he had given and the result was that the Princess was charged with thefts from a number of hotels at Berlin, Munich and Paris. Another accusation of a somewhat different character was also levelled against her. At the time of these incidents the Wredes were living at Schloss Basedow in Mecklenburg which they had rented from Count Fried-

rich Hahn. The owner of the mansion had found it impossible owing to reduced circumstances to keep up his ancestral home and before leaving it he had had the family plate valued up in a vault beneath the house. By an oversight certain odd pieces of silver were allowed to remain locked up in a closet in the cellar. Some of these were found in the sideboard of Princess Wrede and she was charged with breaking open the case and stealing them. Simultaneously the Princess was charged with receiving stolen goods and Wedig with aiding and abetting. The proceedings certainly raised some doubts as to who had been responsible for the abstraction of the Basedow plate from its resting place. It was shown that the Princess had negroes in her employment and that the favor which she showed towards them displeased the white servants who also had been taken from the chest and placed in the sideboard with the sole object of supporting the story of the valet. On the other hand the collection of articles belonging to the hotels could not be explained in this way, and as the simplest hypothesis was on the face of it rather an improbable one, an elaborate and prolonged investigation was held into the state of the mind of the Princess. The issue was that the majority of the specialists consulted held her to be irresponsible for her actions. On the strength of this opinion the court at Quesdrow in Mecklenburg ordered the withdrawal of the prosecution. The Prince had already been exonerated from the charge of receiving the stolen goods, but even if he had not been the case against him would have collapsed with the Queen's judgment, the legal corollary of which is that the theft was not committed, and that therefore it is impossible that anybody should have aided or abetted it, or received the proceeds of it.

## VERY MARKED INCREASE IN DIVORCES IN FRANCE

In 1884 the Total Number Was Only  
1879 While in 1904 It Had  
Risen to 14,692.

PARIS, Aug. 10.—Some interesting statistics on the subject of divorces in France have just been made public. These statistics fully confirm the opinion previously entertained that the evil has been going up steadily in an ascending scale since its revival in this country by a special law in 1884. In that year the total number of divorces amounted to 1879. In 1904, just twenty years afterwards, the number had risen to 14,692. Nineteen hundred and four is the last year of which a record has been obtainable at the Ministry of Justice, but the average has been steadily gaining ever since. It is, however, noteworthy that by far the greater portion of divorces have been granted on the score of cruelty and the like. Thus, those divorces amounted in 1884 to 1,477, and in 1904 to 10,397. In the last named year the divorces granted on the application of husbands for breach of Seventh Commandment were 2,294, those on the petition of wives being 1,997. In 1884 they had been 245 and 97 respectively. Then whereas in 1884 divorces owing to the condemnation of one of the parties to an infamous penalty numbered sixty in 1904 they had risen to 284. Incompatibility of temper seems to be the cause of most of the divorces. But besides these causes there are a good many separations as the Catholic church does not, of course, sanction divorce; so that numbers of people when matrimonial jars occur, refrain from applying to the law courts for divorce, contenting themselves with separation.

## TRANCE POST-MORTEM

Victim Tries to Attack the Dissecting Surgeon.

VIENNA, Aug. 8.—Johann Kovacs, a railway station porter, at Bihari, in Hungary, had yesterday a narrow escape of being dissected alive. Two days ago he fell down unconscious while at work, and was taken to the hospital. The doctor pronounced him dead, and a post-mortem was decided on, for which all preparations were made. The body was put on the dissecting table, where a lecture was delivered over it to the students before the body was opened. At the first prick of the knife Kovacs awoke with a start, and as soon as he realized the position, endeavored to assault the surgeon who held the dissecting knife. He had to be forcibly restrained by the other doctors.

TORONTO, Aug. 9.—The romance of Henry Parr and Ellen Maria Fasken, the youthful bride and groom of Wellington county, is at an end. Judge Maboe has declared the marriage of no effect with the provision that if young Parr objects to the ruling of the court and still pursues the object of his affections, proceedings may be launched against him perpetually restraining him from communicating with his erstwhile bride.

HAVE MERCY ON MERE MAN

Prof. Armstrong Pleads to Women to be Women and Nothing More.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—The British Association listened today to the pleadings of Prof. Henry E. Armstrong for mercy from women. The advanced woman, said the distinguished chemist, was apparently bent aggressively upon displacing man from his position. The same time it was obvious that she was becoming more and more neglectful of her own domain and consequence the foundations of the home, if not all destroyed, were being undermined.

Traditions which had guided women in the past were being given up. If disruption were to be avoided there must be framed scientific conceptions of the mutual duties and responsibilities of the sexes.

"My present object," Prof. Armstrong said, "is to file a petition for help on behalf of the weaker sex, the men, those frail creatures who are absolutely dependent on women. It is our pride and privilege to fight for women as well as to provide food and shelter for them. Before they have secured us, before they marry us, we are called upon to show that we can provide means to keep the house going."

"I shall we not soon be justified in asking women to produce certificates of competency, to give proof that they are skilled in all matters relating to household management? Is not the time at hand when the pendulum should swing back and women cease their unreasonable competition with men? The place of women in society is defined by nature. She is superior."

The speaker then appealed to women to adapt themselves to their own nature and not to simply follow men. They should glory in meeting the requirements of their natural duties, which are chiefly in relation to home life.
