### Dedication at Ludlow-

Dedication at Ludiew.

The new Baptist meeting house at Ludiow, Northumberland Uo, N. B., was dedicated on Thursday, June the 7th, in the presence of a large congregation.

G. mou'ding on top, and above the moulding is fret work to correspond with the inside finish. The best possible arrangements have been made for sentilation. The platform, which is neatly carpeted, is large so as to accommodate the choir and organ. The desk, made of sah with neat trimmings, is an excellent piece of work-manship. There are also three neath the ends orsamented. The seating capacity of the house being about 150. All the work was done under the supervision of Bro. Abet R.
