Washington, 30. — A remote age when there will be no water on a hot side of the earth continually facing the sun while the earth's revolutions around the sun goes on unobscured has been predicted by Dr. W. J. Spillman. "The time will come," he said, "perhaps some billions of years from now when the earth will make one revolution on its axis while it is revolving around the sun with the same side toward the sun all the time. At the center of that sun-swept side, where the sun will stand directly overhead all the time, it will be boiling hot, and on the other side of the earth the temperature will be around 50 degrees below zero and the conditions will stay that way for all time."

TELEPHONE SERVICE LUXURY IN JAPAN

Japan, 30. — The high cost of having a telephone in Japan has shown a decided decline since the recent announcement in that country of the formation of a semi-official telephone company. Prices of telephones which were formerly at 1,300 yen (\$850) have dropped to 800 yen (\$430). These are quotations from the open market in which prospective users bid for the privilege of having a telephone.

FEWER EMIGRANTS TO UNITED STATES

Ottawa, 30. — Immigrants from Canada to the United States during the month of August were greatly on the decline and only 4,137 entered, compared with 7,648 in 1929.

CANADIAN BUILDING IS ABOVE AVERAGE

Ottawa, 30. — The value of contracts awarded in Canada during August was \$467,200 according to a report of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Although this total was considerably below the value of contracts awarded in August, 1929, it is 20 per cent in excess of the average for the month during the past five years.

GERMANY REDUCING WHEAT CONSUMPTION

Ottawa, 30. — According to a trade report received from Berlin the Federal Railway Company of Germany will serve no more wheat cereals on its dining cars. This is with the view of stemming the tide of wheat imports into the country. It is expected that the wheat menu will stimulate German wheat consumption in breads. At the present time Germany produces 125,000,000 bushels of wheat and consumes 222,000,000 bushels and at the same time produces 234,645,000 bushels of rye and consumes only 255,000,000 bushels.
