Mrs. Dickinson was 54 years of age, and had lived in Cabano for the past thirty three years. Funeral service was held on Wednesday afternoon, September 23rd, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. H. S. Anderson of Edmundston. Rev. W. A. VICE-REGAL PARTY VISITS EDMUNDSTON 2000 CHILDREN GREET THE EARL OF BESSBOROUGH

At ten o'clock on Monday morning September 28th, the Vice-Regal train arrived at the Canadian National Station. The Mayor, Hon. E. Noil Michaud, and the members of the Town Council met the train and welcomed his Excellency, Lord Bessborough. The streets were lined with automobiles, and the local and Provincial Police rendered splendid service in keeping the crowds back. The Governor General was accompanied by his Secretary, A. F. Lascelles, and Lt. F. N. Fuller, R. N., Aide-Camp.

The local band, under the direction of Sidney Laporte, played the National Anthem, after which the Vice-Regal party was conducted to a car driven by Gilbert Clair. The procession, headed by Sgt. James of the Provincial Police, and followed by a mounted guard under the leadership of S. Barber, passed through the principal streets of the town to the High School, the entrance of which was attractively decorated for the occasion by singing "O CANADA". Cadet Lieutenant, Claude Young, was complimented by His Excellency on the splendid appearance of the Cadet Corps.

THE ADDRESS

Following is the address of welcome which was read by the Mayor in both French and English, artistically written on valuable parchment:

"To His Excellency The Honourable The Earl of Bessborough, P. C., G. C. M. G., Governor-General of Canada.

May it please Your Excellency: The Citizens of Edmundston represented by the Mayor and the Town Council crave the honour and the privilege of presenting you their respectful homage and welcome on this first official visit to the fertile valley of Madawaska and Town of Edmundston.

If, today, we can with pride proclaim ourselves loyal subjects of His Britannic Majesty and if the International line which separates the American Republic and the Dominion of Canada does not extend further north than the Saint John River, thanks must be due to the efforts of our ancestors, who, hardly fifty years after their forcible deportation from their land of Acadia, put a stop to the American invasion in order to save this territory for the British Crown. It was in recognition of the loyalty of the inhabitants of Madawaska that the shiretown was named after a Governor Sir Edmund Head, and it is on that account that today the citizens of Edmundston have the privilege to extend their hearty welcome to you as His Majesty's representative.

N. B. PREMIER'S ADDRESS TO THE GOV. GENERAL

The following is the official address presented to His Excellency, the Governor-General, by Hon. C. D. Richards, Premier of New Brunswick on behalf of the people of the Province, September 29th.

To His Excellency, the Right Honourable, The Earl of Bessborough, a member of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the most distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada.

May it please Your Excellency: It is with a sincere feeling of pleasure and satisfaction that we extend to Your Excellency, on behalf of the people of the Province of New Brunswick a most cordial welcome on the occasion of your first visit to this Province. We recall the fact that in person Your Excellency is the representative of a family whose record of public service in the Mother Country goes back to a period a few years prior to the organization of this Province to the British Crown.

In common with the other portions of the Dominion, this Province has been affected by the general world-wide business and economic depression, particularly in its relation to our basic industries of agriculture and lumbering. We may not, therefore, at this time, as on former similar occasions, point to the expertise which are the usual accompaniments of advancement and prosperities of normal conditions, but we have a confident belief in the strength and character of our people, in their courage and ability to overcome the present temporary difficulties and emerge with the other portions of the Dominion upon an even higher plane of progress and achievement. It is perhaps particularly appropriate that at this we have as the representative of the Crown in this Dominion one who has had
