CAPITAL MAYOR EXPLAINS

Fredericton, July 16.—Manager Bob Ganley, of the Fredericton baseball club, will not be suspended by Mayor Hooper, President of the New Brunswick and Maine League, for his assault upon Umpire Frank W. McCann during last Friday's ball game at St. John. This morning Mayor Hooper said that he did not recognize McCann as an official umpire on Friday, as it had been distinctly understood that he was released on Thursday without a stipulation as to the release not taking effect until Saturday, as Secretary Donald, of the League, now alleges.

"I don't condone the action of Manager Ganley," said the President, "in fact, I wish to express myself as unalterably opposed to anything that will tend towards rowdy ball, and if Umpire McCann had not fixed the amount of the fine upon Ganley I would have made the League's assessment even larger than Magistrate Ritchie made it at St. John. However, McCann had no right acting as umpire, and particularly as umpire in chief, on Friday, but I have approved of the fines he imposed. He was through on Thursday night."

Mayor Hooper has sent some sizzling letters to managers of the clubs in the league telling what will be done to players who are guilty of rowdy ball, and instructing the umpires not to make penalties, but to report to him and he would do that part of it. A meeting of the executive of the league has been ordered called.

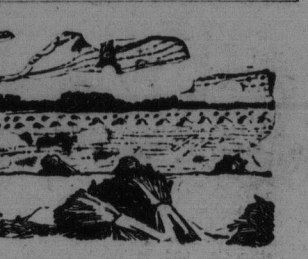
WILL SAIL THURSDAY.

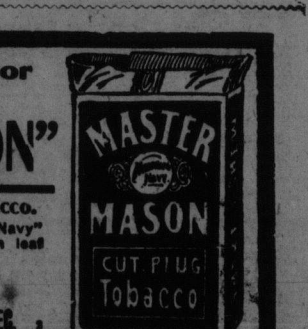

TO BE IN BRIEF

Prince of Wales Taken Prisoner in Sham Battle—Italy has Big Labor Strike—Polo Games Receipts.

The Duchess Much Improved.
New York, June 16.—A London cable says: The Duchess of Cornwall has improved very much, and now hopes to go to Bagshot Park very soon. Princess Patricia has consented to give her name to a farm settlement for educated women, which is now being started in the Okanagan Valley, British Columbia, in behalf of which a concert is to be held in Grosvenor House on June 25. The farm is to be known as the Princess Patricia Farm.

Big Strike in Italy.

Milan, Italy, June 14.—A general strike of the workmen of all trades was proclaimed here today as a protest against the condemnation to prison of eighteen workmen who were arrested for various offences during the recent strike at the iron works.

There's Money in Polo.

New York, June 16.—The gate receipts of the two games of the international polo on Tuesday and Wednesday were \$20,000 and \$20,000—a greater sum than ever has been taken in during two days of polo in the world's series. The figures were \$20,000 on Tuesday and \$20,000 on Wednesday. The expenses are understood to be about \$25,000. What the American Polo Association will do with the balance.

It looks now as if the Maritime Oilfields Limited will soon be boring near Sussex, says the Kings County Record.
