To Help The Belgians

HARTLAND SHOWS PATRIOTIC SPIRIT

Hartland, N. B., Nov. 2.—Considering the population, Hartland is taking up the patriotic movement on as large a scale as any other section of the province. Already about \$1,000 has been collected here for the patriotic fund, and a large quantity of clothing and other goods have gone forward to swell the relief of the suffering Belgians. There are other moves on foot to raise money for the same objects, which will materialize in the immediate future.

There has just been formed the Hartland Patriotic Association which will go into the matter in a systematic manner, and their efforts in this line will materially add to New Brunswick's assistance both to our soldier boys and the brave Belgians who have been overwhelmed in their efforts to uphold the right.

This association is sending out a circular to the school teachers of the section immediately surrounding Hartland. It says in part: "Dear Teacher.—The Hartland Patriotic Association has decided to enlarge its activities and to include relief for the Belgians. A sub-committee has been appointed to look after this phase of the work. At a meeting of this committee last Thursday evening (Oct. 29) it was proposed to ask the farmers and others of Hartland and surrounding districts to give two cartloads of more of potatoes to help in some measure to relieve the famine threatening the Belgians. Each family will be asked to give as he feels he is able. Those who cannot or do not wish to give potatoes may give money, if it is their desire to help. To carry out this scheme it was proposed to enlist the co-operation of the teachers of the outlying districts.

Will you promise us your assistance? You know something of the condition of the unfortunate people of Belgium—how urgent is their need—several million of them with only a week's supply of food in sight and their land completely desolated and ravaged by the barbarian Germans. The shippers here have offered their services in raking, bagging and loading. So our only cost will be the purchase and labelling of the bags, which cost will be provided for out of general patriotic fund or by special entertainment.

It was also proposed to make this an advertising scheme by having each bag labelled "Cartload County Potatoes," or something to that effect. We also suggest that each farmer put his own name and address with his potatoes.
