FOUND TO BE
WRONG AGAIN

**Hon. Mr. Clarke Says Inter-
view re-Colonization Schem-
e "Distorted and Wholly
Unauthorized."**

Under a caption, "Premier Clarke Thinks Mr. Murray's Scheme Impractical," the Telegraph on Saturday printed what purported to be an interview with Hon. Mr. Clarke, in which he pronounced the proposed scheme of the premier Clarke did not say that Mr. Murray's scheme was "impractical." On the contrary the premier states that it is the full approval of himself and the other members of the government.

In order that the false impression which the Telegraph's article might create, may be corrected, Hon. Mr. Clarke has been good enough to direct that newspaper, accompanied with the request that it be published. He has sent The Standard a copy of the letter, which serves to show that the article in the Telegraph is distorted and wholly unauthorized.

The letter is as follows:

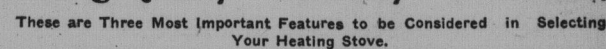
