TRAVELLERS' AID HOME.

The flat taken by the Young Women's Christian Association for Travellers' Aid is now open for guests. An informal reception was held on Wednesday afternoon when the House Committee invited the members of the Travellers' Aid Committee to inspect the arrangements made. The House Mother is established there. Miss Hoyt is on hand to bring travellers there. Already two visitors have been entertained who stayed until late train when they were seen safely on board.

The house is near the corner of Union and Dock street. An electric sign will soon be placed above the door so that it can be seen from Dock street. The doors have been covered throughout with linoleum. The rooms are convenient and the whole flat is capable of housing twelve guests at once. One room is to be fitted up as a dormitory with single beds, another room is arranged so that a mother and several children could be accommodated there in comfort. The rest room is pleasant with comfortable chairs, books and flowers and a decidedly homey look about it. It also can be turned into a bedroom if needed. The dining room and kitchen are combined and meals will be served to those desiring them.

Everything looks new and clean and Miss Hoyt and Mrs. Forbes the House-Mother are enthusiastic about the spread of the work in the larger quarters.

At the next meeting of the directors an opportunity will be given to the members of the Board to inspect the new quarters.

Those who have gone to the country have not forgotten the brave lads overseas who have no summer holiday from fighting the Empire's battles and from the country come in bundles and packages from circles of workers who sew and knit on verandas and lawns. The Central Circle meets every Tuesday. The young people are making comfort bags at present, while the hospital shirts, pyjamas, surgical supplies and socks are looked after by the others.

West Side Field Comforts Circle. Doing their bit and more than their bit is the West Side Field Comforts Circle who are even now planning for a fair to be held in the Autumn for Christmas stockings for Soldiers. The comedy which was lately given by this energetic Association brought in \$113, which was voted to the Military Y. M. C. A. It is expected that this entertainment will be repeated for the benefit of the Benevolent Fund of the Great War Veterans' Association.

Seven quilts have been ordered to be made and members are working over these which bring in an addition to the funds of the Circle.

The members who have gone to the country are not idle but have formed Circles there which are stitching, knitting and planning for those who overseas, are keeping the flag flying the symbol of liberty and freedom from injustice.

Meetings in the West Side are held every Tuesday evening when there is a good attendance of loyal workers.

"A wonderful picture" said the lady who goes with me to the movies, and indeed it is a wonderful picture this Fox production with husky Bill Farnum as the hero. To begin with there is mountain scenery, lots of it, then there are fights lots of them, and once Bill gets one in the mouth, a blow which he can't return either. He is very fine in this scene. You can just imagine how his eyes would flash and see his big strong hands clench and unclench themselves. It reminded me of the text about overcoming oneself who greater than he that take a strong city. It is a sure enough western picture, not a cowboy riding kind, but a mining "don't dare come one step further," one with dance halls, explosions in mines and plots against Bill and his very babyish partner Dick.
