London, Oct. 18.—The cessation of oasi mining thmroughout the country seems complete, for, although the miners in some districts appear to have entered the strike in a half-hearted manner, there is no sign yet of any break in the ranks of the men and consequely the dislocation of the country's industry is becoming wide-spread. Nor is there indication of any mediation growing out of today's various conferences, all parties ap-parently awaiting the reassembling of parliament tomorrow, when it is expected the discussion of the strike will displace the Irish Home Rule Bill which was the first scheduled be-fore the House of Commons.


