

FOUR-POWER PACIFIC TREATY TANGLED UP

Administration Ratification Programme Tied in a Knot by Mix-up.

Washington, March 26.—The "Four Power Pacific Treaty" and its supplements got into such a mix-up in the Senate, yesterday, that the administration ratification programme was temporarily tied in a knot and the leaders hurried into conference to draw up a new plan of campaign.

Challenging the validity of yesterday's action, by which the Four Power Treaty itself was ratified, opponents of the treaty suggested that the vote be reconsidered so that the ratification could include the supplementary interpretative agreement signed by the plenipotentiaries at the same time. At first, the Administration leaders refused to recognize any merit in the suggestion, but, after several conferences, they decided that some further action was advisable. Most of them opposed the reconsideration plan, proposing, instead, a separate ratification vote on the supplement. Such a separate resolution of ratification was in progress of drafting when the Senate adjourned over Sunday.

BOILER EXPLOSION KILLED FOUR MEN

Flying Timbers and Metal Cut Down Telegraph and Telephone Poles.

Sarnia, Ont., March 26.—Four men lost their lives when the boiler of the ferry boat Omar D. Conger, operating between this town and Port Huron, exploded at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The boiler was lifted out of the boat and thrown on top of a house on Quay street, some distance away, completely demolishing the house and setting it afire.

The boat, which was the property of Henry McMorran, ex-United States Senator, was completely wrecked and will be a total loss, as it carries no insurance for boiler explosion. Flying timbers and metal cut down telegraph and telephone poles for 300 yards along the shore.

Montreal, March 27.—Nineteen families were driven from their homes here tonight when fire of undetermined origin broke out in a block of dwellings at 138-179 Hoga street. Ten other families were forced to take their furniture out during the progress of the flames. The fire leaped from 9 until after one in the morning. There were no injuries that were serious. It was not possible to ascertain damage sustained.

LOOKS FOR FAVORABLE RESULTS IN IRELAND

Secretary for Colonies Has Strong Faith Things Will Come Out All Right.

Northampton, Eng., March 26.—Winston Spencer Churchill, Secretary for the Colonies, speaking at a political meeting today, declared that the way in which the Government of Southern Ireland was carrying out its difficult task led him to hope for favorable results. He said that when a political leader like Eamon De Valera made threats it suggested that he had lost the support of the masses of Irish people.

Mr. Churchill asserted that since the Government of Ireland, broadly speaking, had been entirely loyal to Irishmen, it was for them to decide what they would do with it. "Will they sink into a state of anarchy and strife?" he asked, "or will they rise hopefully and faithfully to a bright future of peace and freedom which is within their grasp? It is for them to decide."

INTERIM SUPPLY BEFORE PARLIAMENT TODAY

Measure Necessary in Order That Gov't May Have Funds to Carry on.

Ottawa, March 26.—(By Canadian Press)—Discussion of the interim supply bill, asking the House to vote one-fourth of the total estimates, or approximately \$116,746,839.75, will be the chief business before the Commons tomorrow. The introduction of the bill was forecasted by Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, before the House on Friday. The approach of the end of the fiscal year, March 31, makes the measure necessary in order that the Government may obtain funds to carry on until the main estimates are approved. The supply bill will meet with a measure of opposition from the Conservatives, although it is expected that the House will pass it.

UNITED STATES SENT SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE
