Here again, as so often before, will be noticed the continued distinction between "preaching" and "ministering"; and the limitation of the use of the Surplice to Cathedral and Collegiate Churches clearly is in strict harmony and conformity with the prevalent and universal practice, namely, the Gown in the Pulpit—or the ordinary clerical or academical habit which Queen *Etizabeth's* injunction prescribed for "in the Church and without."

To be sure, the wisdom of our day contemns all these rules and usages as foolish ness,—and as contary to the Rubrics of the Church as Puseyism interprets them as against their wiser and more Scriptural meaning attached to them by the very men who prepared and enacted them!

A singularly apt and appropriate illustration of the "practice" prevailing in the caller ages is bound in Styrpe's Life of Paryer, book 8, chapter 12. It is written:—

As they made no provision for the supply of their churches, the Archbishop and Bishop of London procured other clergymen, including their Chaplains, to supply the vacant churches. The Archbishop in a letter to Secretary Cecil complained that 'divers Church Wardens to make a trouble and a difficulty would provide neither Surplice nor bread and they did mostly but preach."

Thus it will appear that these clergymen had ample authority to preach, yet having no Surplice, but had they pretended to say the prayers or minister the
