FINANCING IS BIG PROBLEM OF RAILWAYS

Earnings Must Increase Or Transportation Systems Face Paralysis.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 29.—A comprehensive study of railway conditions in the United States was begun by the administration today with a view to formulation of a definite program for railway rehabilitation. Since it took up the reins of authority the administration has heard rumblings of dissatisfaction from many sources, the roads complaining of inadequate income, the employees protesting against impending wage reduction, shippers asking for a reduction of freight rates, and in some cases the general public appealing for better service. All of these points of dissatisfaction are to be examined in the administration's inquiry. Even the tariff question, which is to be the principal topic of consideration for the next session of Congress, is considered by administration authorities to be closely connected with the transportation problem. The most serious feature of the situation, however, as it has been pictured by administration officials, is the apparent inability of the carriers themselves to make both ends meet and at the same time keep service up to standard. A number of high railway officials have called on Mr. Harding since his election and have told him that unless some way to increase earnings was found the whole transportation of the country faced paralysis. It is understood that although few definite remedial programs have been suggested in these conferences, most of those who have presented the carriers' side of the problem have advised against any general increase in freight rates. A further material increase in the price of fuel has been mentioned by Mr. Harding as being likely to result in such a curtailment of traffic as actually to reduce earnings rather than to increase them.

HONORABLE DISCHARGE FOR EMPLOYEES HELD FOR THEFT AT SARNIA

Allan Dingwall Pleads Guilty and Elects Summary Trial.

SARNIA, March 29.—Oscar Anderson and William Hunter, employees of the Police on the Sarnia branch, were discharged in police court today on a charge of breaking into a car and stealing merchandise at the warehouse of Hamilton, Ontario, on March 10. Allan Dingwall, charged with stealing shoes, was remanded for trial without bail, after pleading guilty. The case of Fred H. Haley, who elected trial by jury at a former sitting of the court, will be heard at the next criminal sittings.

Pleaded Guilty.

The courtroom was crowded when court opened at 10 o'clock this morning. Employees, Allan Dingwall, after hearing the charge, pleaded guilty and elected summary trial, and was remanded for sentence without bail, and later gave evidence in the hearing of the other charges. Evidence was given by Edward J. O'Connor, a Sarnia constable, and John Crammer, local G. R. officer.

Covered With Ice.

Her decks covered with ice, the Standard Oil Company's tanker William S. Cowan passed down the River St. Clair today. The S. Cowan is the second boat to pass Sarnia since the opening of navigation. Another Standard Oil tanker passed up into Lake Huron this afternoon.

The deep waterways project was discussed at some length by the city council at a special session, and a grant of \$100 was made to the Canadian Association.

DEATH LIST IN CHICAGO CRASH MAY REACH 12

Between 75 and 100 Injured in Mysterious Explosion.

CHICAGO, March 29.—The casualty list in the mysterious explosion in a warehouse in the west side Italian tenement district today was indefinite to-night, and a quadruple investigation by branches of the city government had not been able to establish definitely the cause of the disaster. Six bodies were recovered from the wreckage, six more were believed to be in it, and the list of injured was set at from 75 to 100. Chief of Police Fitzmorris announced after a personal survey of the scene that indications were that ignition in some unknown way of more than a ton of fireworks stored in a small building near the warehouse had been the cause of the explosion.

A special administrative committee, the fire prevention committee, and the building committee withheld judgment, saying they were still gathering evidence.

The warehouse, owned by Weil & Co., paper dealers, was an L-shaped structure. In the angle formed the "L" was a small building, in which the Singer-Shaffer Company, novelty manufacturers, were alleged to have stored more than a ton of fireworks in violation of city ordinances.

Scores of fireworks labels, percussion caps, pieces of firecrackers, and torpedoes were found after the explosion. Other theories as to the cause of the disaster were faulty gas mains and bombs, but the police were inclined to believe these after a cursory investigation.
