U. of T. Send Brandon Coyotes To Holes With 8-1 Victory

Students Showed Brilliant Reversal of Form and Got Back Two-Goal Margin in First Period—West-erners Had No Alibi.

WINNIPEG, March 21.—By Canadian Press.—The Allan cup goes east. The Toronto Varsity hockey machine, which surrendered the trophy to the west last night, came from behind with an avalanche of goals, and proved beyond all doubt their right to be termed amateur champions of Canada. The wonderful reversal in form of both teams was another of those strange happenings in hockey. The easterners played for ten minutes in the first period, finally opened fire, and in the first half hour had the game and the Allan cup away with one of the most brilliant exhibitions of sharpshooting seen here in many a day, scoring four goals. This was enough to clinch matters, but just to show the west that they possessed the class, they added two more in the final session, and trotted off the ice in the final session winners of the round, 8 to 1.

Desperate Struggle.
For thirty minutes the teams fought desperately for supremacy, and it was soon apparent that the students are a much different aggregation from the one that went down to a 2-0 defeat on Saturday. The easterners played the best of the breaks to have a two-goal margin in the first session, long before the second period had begun. Brandon failed to tally on any very close plays. But when the Manitoba boys tallied early in the second period, it looked like anybody's game. For ten minutes of that second session Brandon more than held their own, and had their opponents backed up against their own goal. TORONTO, March 21.—Stratford juniors defeated Lower Canada College, junior champions of Quebec, tonight by a score of 13 goals to 5, and will therefore meet the speedy Falcons of Winnipeg Thursday and Saturday of this week for the memorial cup. The score was hopelessly one-sided, but the little Montrealers were game all the way through. Several of them were under 16 years of age. Evidently, their center player, weighs only 105 pounds. The winners were much heavier players, and kept on the bench until the end of the period.

Stratford merely romped through the game. In the first period they worked through the easterners' defense line after time. When it was seen during the second period that the Montrealers had no chance, Carson and Moreau, who are popularly regarded as Stratford's whole team, were taken out and kept on the bench until the end of the period.

The game was fast and clean, with some perhaps unnecessarily heavy body-checking by Stratford. The losers came in for plentiful applause for the tenacity with which they clung to their checks, and the spectators cheered lustily whenever they upset one of their bigger opponents. The line-up:

Western Ontario Secondary Schools Association Is Now Accomplished Fact

Twenty-One Charter Members in New Body, Which Will Co-Ordinate Athletic and Literary Efforts of the Schools in Area.

The balloting for the officers of the Western Ontario Secondary Schools Association closed last week with 21 charter members in the new organization. Following are the officers of the new association for the next two years: Honorary president, Hon. R. H. Grant, minister of education; honorary vice-president, E. S. Little, Mayor of London; president, E. A. Miller, M.A., London Collegiate Institute; vice-president, C. L. Brown, M.A., Sarnia Collegiate Institute; secretary-treasurer, G. Mel. Brock, B.A., Western University; councilors, G. S. Campbell, M.A., Windsor Collegiate Institute, A. M. Overholt, M.A., Brantford Collegiate Institute, W. J. Salter, B.A., Woodstock Collegiate Institute, J. F. Rose, M.A., Sandford College Institute.

This new body will take office on June 1 next, and as the constitution of the association has already been adopted, it remains for these officials to map out plans for supervising the literary and athletic activities of the high schools and collegiate institutes of Western Ontario.

It is hoped that the new association will be able to carry out the following program, commencing next fall, for the boys: Rugby and soccer; basketball, debating and hockey in the winter, and a track meet in the spring. The girls' program comprises field hockey in the fall, basketball and debating in the winter, and indoor baseball played outside in the spring.

The basketball tournament which is being held in the local armories on March 31 and April 1 will be conducted under the auspices of the W. O. A. A. as will a monster track meet on May 21. With the consent of the donors, the trophies will then be turned over to the new association, as all competitions in future will be directed by them.

The Western University authorities deserve a great deal of credit for the work they have spent in bringing into being this association, which should prove such a benefit to the students of the secondary schools.

It is understood that a similar organization is being undertaken in Toronto for the students of Central Ontario, and it is hoped that this will be followed by one in Eastern Ontario.

Crank Who Threatened Man of War Gets Three Months

PHILADELPHIA, March 21.—Harry T. Lamey of Chester, Pa., who threatened to harm John o' War, Samuel D. Riddle's famous race horse, was sentenced today to three months in the county jail at Trenton, N. J. He had pleaded guilty.

Lamey admitted that he wrote a letter to Mrs. Riddle, wife of the owner of Man o' War, threatening her and the horse with bodily harm if he was not paid \$10,000. He declared that he had not intended to force payment of the money, merely "wanting to see what the Riddles would do."

BRANTFORD, March 21.—A federation for the control of amateur baseball in Brantford became a reality at a meeting of the various clubs in the city tonight, and as a result practically all amateur baseball of the city will be under one central organization.

W. F. A. INTEND TO RAISE ITS FEES

Annual Meeting Friday Will See Some Amendments Proposed.

KITCHENER, March 21.—Besides the usual business of the 42nd annual W. F. A. meeting on Good Friday, including the nomination and election of officers, the following proposed amendments to the laws of the game and cup competition rules will come up for discussion:

1. Change of the last clause of paragraph 1, article 7, page 2, to read: "The executive shall recommend to the annual meeting the amount to be paid to the secretary-treasurer as an honorarium for the previous year's services."
2. To change "Match Committee," article 11, page 3, to "Emergency Committee," and extend its powers.
3. To provide for an increase in revenue by:
- (a) Raising the affiliation fee.
- (b) Increasing the registration fee.
- (c) Sharing in the gross gate of all final and immediate semi-final matches to the extent of 25 per cent.
4. To conform to the recent changes in the O. F. A. and D. F. A. rules, none of which are radical as far as W. F. A. rules are concerned.
5. Add to rule 12: "Nothing in this rule, however, shall prevent the president from using his good offices to try to effect an amicable settlement of the matter in dispute between the two parties."
6. Change "the holders of" in rule 5, page 15, to "contestants for," and "third" to "last."
7. Omit rules 4, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 from Hough Cup Rules, and change rules 5, 11 and 12 to Rules 4, 5 and 6.

A meeting of the executive committee will be held prior to the annual meeting, at 10 a.m.
