UNB Debators Head For Centennial Competition

Two third year honors arts students will represent the University of New Brunswick at this week's Centennial Debating Championship being held at the University of Western Ontario in London.

The Unb debators are Terry Fisher, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles El Fisher, 116 Miles Street, Fredericton and Patrick S. Bennett, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Bennett of St. Elizabeth, Jamaica.

The debating championship provides the first opportunity for UNB to participate at an official Centennial Year event. It will run from Jan. 13-15.

The principal topic to be debated by the university student teams is: "Be it resolved that the Confederation experiment is a success". Secondary topics on related matters will also be debated by the participating students. During the two-day championship, team members will have the opportunity of debating both the affirmative and negative side of the resolution.
