However, the race died the next day when both Mr. Wright and Mrs. Gielen withdrew and Mayor Speck was acclaimed to a second straight three-year term as the town's chieftain. Ward 2 Councillor Lou Parsons retained his seat by acclamation while Ward Councillor Grant Clark-

son won the Deputy-reeve's chair by the same route. DUNDAS ST.

The Mississauga planning board released a report on the state and future of Dundas St., one of the town's major traffic routes. The report recommends a new lease on life and a facelift for the use-worn
