

Where does Susan find all the time?

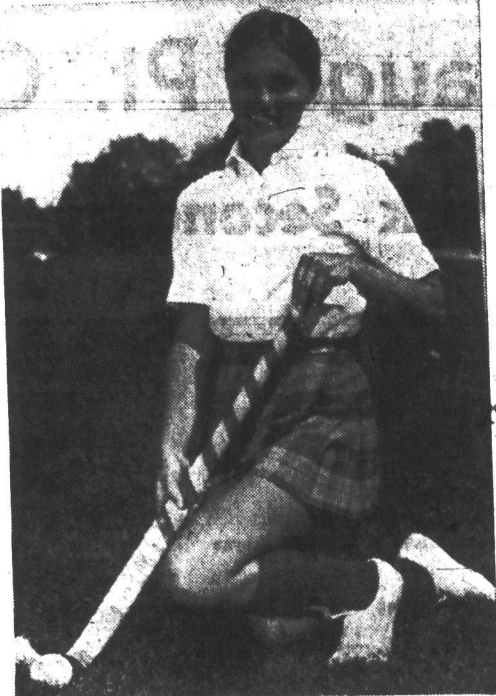
PORT CREDIT — The first question that comes to mind when discussing Susan Hasbury of Port Credit Secondary is, "Where does she find the time to do all the things she does?"

Mississauga growing fast

ETOBICOKE — At the rate the Mississauga Track Club is going, don't be surprised if they're tops in Canada in a few years.

It's mainly through the efforts of coach Clare Marshall that the club is doing so well. Although Marshall is critical of the lack of track facilities in Mississauga, he has managed to make the most of what there is and in the short year of the club's existence has moulded a formidable team.

Their worth was proven last weekend at the Central Ontario bantam and midget two-day track and field championships at Etobicoke Stadium. Mississauga tallied 118 points for fifth spot among 32 clubs entered in the meet.

Scarboro Optimists for the second straight year won the event with 287 points. Park-

dale Lions was second with 183; Ajax Pronghorns third with 135; and Uplands Harriers with 134. Mississauga was the host club for the meet.

Roy Dickson continued to carry the banner of Mississauga as the youngster posted what is to be believed a Canadian record for bantam boys in the 400-meter run. His time of 55.5 seconds was almost a second faster than that of an Uplands runner. Dickson was second in the boys javelin; fourth in the shut put; and second in the discus.

Carol Rich ran third in the midget girls 400 while Judy Matheson and Ann Godkin were second and third respectively in the bantam girls 400-meter while Scott Killen posted a personal best in the first heat of the bantam boys 1,500-meter final.

Mississauga's girls relay

team finished a strong second in the 4x100 relay.

Cheryl Gregory was third in the midget girls shotput with a throw of 30 feet, 8 1/2 inches and third in the javelin with a toss of 94 feet, 4 1/2 inches.

Dan Glugosh posted a personal best in the midget boys triple jump. Winner of the event from Ottawa Upland Harriers, Jim Buchanan, set a wind-assisted Canadian record.

Cheryl also lost out on the last throw of the midget girls discus with a personal best toss of 107 feet, three inches. Dan Glugosh also established a personal best in the midget boys long jump.

Adrian Hussey was fourth overall in the midget boys 800-meter run while Carol Rich had a personal best in the midget girls long jump. Bob Albino was fifth in the midget boys javelin. Hussey also

ranked second overall in the midget boys 300-meter hurdles.

The other big win went to the midget girls 800-relay when Mississauga won the event. Mississauga was second in the midget boys mile sprint medley relay and third in the bantam girls 880-yd. medley relay final.
