

- Q And then you told us you went to Flin Flon where you were in the mines for a while and then you went harvesting ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q Where did you pick up your civilian clothes after you left the hospital ?
- A In Point Barrow.
- Q At any time did you have any military clothes with you ?
- A No, Sir. When I left the hospital I was in my blues, with my Army boots on and my socks.
- Q What did you do with your blues and your boots and socks when you acquired these civilian clothes at Point Barrow ?
- A I took them with me.
- Q You carried them with you ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q You wore the civilian clothes ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q I don't suppose you ever put on your hospital blues ?
- A Yes, I have, Sir.
- Q When ?
- A I wore them nights in the house.
- Q Just around the house ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q Sort of lounging clothes, is that correct ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q But so far as the outdoors, working on your jobs, you wore civilian clothes ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q Were you asked on any occasion about service in the Army ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q What were your replies ?
- A Well, Sir, I had rejection papers from the Army made out in M.D. 10 in 1942 -- the 9th of January.
- Q Who signed them ?
- A Major M. Garton
- Q Did he actually sign them ?
- A Yes, Sir. I got them from an officer in the Administration Building.
