DESTROY THE RAILWAY

Russians Are Making a Permanent Job of It This Time.

The inference is drawn that they do not contemplate recovering the situation—Natives Credit Japanese With Almost Hopeless Attempt to Transfer Bulk of Five Armies to Vladivostok in a Roundabout Way.

London, April 3.—The correspondent at Tokio of The Times says: "Reports from Manchuria show that the Russians are destroying the railroads more thoroughly than the Chinese. The evident inference is that they do not contemplate recovering the situation."

Japs' Big Undertaking.
Gunshu Pass (108 miles north of Tie Pass), April 3.—The situation here is unchanged. Gen. Mischenko has moved forward into close touch with the Japanese and keeps up constant skirmishing. Elsewhere everything is quiet.

Native reports, which may be taken for what they are worth, state that the Japanese are leaving the Russian front, only a screen, capable, with the help of the Mukden and Tie Pass fortifications and garrisons, of holding in check Gen. Linewitch, and are transferring the bulk of their five armies to Vladivostok by means of a wide movement through Mongolia to Tatsihar. Considering the great distance involved, the Japanese are bold and almost impracticable; but Japanese intonation from continual success, bold initiative and determined perseverance must be regarded. The situation affords an opportunity for Russian cavalry, which thus far has played an insignificant role, to distinguish itself by penetrating the Japanese intention. Gen. Linewitch has ordered the resumption of drills, keeping the soldiers occupied in the daytime, and music in the bivouacs at night. An energetic regime is being instituted.

Left 2,000 Troopers.
Tokio, April 3.—The following official advice has been received from army headquarters in Manchuria:

"Our scouts advanced toward Halling and collided with 300 of the enemy's cavalry at Shaulengtz, 30 miles southwest of Seling, on the morning of March 28. The enemy, 500 men strong, retreated to Halling, leaving 2,000 troopers. There are large stores of cereals at various points between Yingcheng and Sanchengzu. The situation is unchanged in the Changchun and Kirin directions."

Dangerous Scouting Feat.
With Gen. Linewitch in the field, April 1, via Pusan, April 3.—Two detachments of Japanese cavalry have returned to the army after the most extensive and dangerous scouting exploit of the war. The detachments were sent north early in January under the leadership of Col. Nomura and Major Sasagawa and each numbered 150 men. Only 100 men of each detachment returned. They explored the Russian positions west of Mukden. They encountered and eluded many forces of Russian cavalry and penetrated Gen. Mischenko's lines. They moved northward they crossed the railroad, cutting the road and the telegraph lines during the battle. Afterwards they visited Kirin and explored that place and finally returned to the army north of Kirin.

Linevitch Reports No Change.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—A despatch from Gen. Linevitch dated March 31 said no change had then taken place in the situation at the front.

Movements of Two Armies.
No Fighting is Reported From Four Japanese Forces.

Tokio, April 3.—The following report dated April 1, has been received from the headquarters of the Japanese armies in the front:

"Our force in the direction of Singling (about 80 miles east of Mukden) reports that, according to information received from the natives, a force of Russians and mounted bands, under Col. Madoloff, which has been based at Halling, has returned to the north. According to other natives, Kirin seems to be the place selected by the enemy for assembling."

"Our force at Welhuanpomen (35 miles northeast of Tie Pass) reports that there has been no change in the enemy's positions in the vicinity of Manhuahieh. There are some Russian infantry and cavalry about 32 miles northeast of Kailuan (25 miles from Tie Pass)."

"Our force at Changtu (40 miles above Tie Pass) reports that the enemy's cavalry outposts retreated 25 miles north of Changtu after burning the railroad station at Souastou."

"Our force at Fakoman (30 miles north of Tie Pass) reports that cavalry outposts of the enemy have been observed 30 miles northeast of that place and that mixed forces of the enemy occupy Fenghu (15 miles northeast of Fakoman). Faminechen (about 15 miles west of Fenghu) and their vicinity."

Homesick Jap Suicided.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—At the bureau established to look after the Japanese prisoners the story of the suicide of a number of Japanese imprisoned at Medvid is officially declared to be entirely misrepresented. One of a batch of 125 new arrivals who was invalided because very homesick and took his life. No complaints of ill-treatment have been received.

Russia Gets More Cars.
Paris, April 3.—The Russian Government has ordered 2,000 cars and 170 locomotives of the St. Etienne Iron Works. It is understood that they are intended for increasing the military equipment of the trans-Siberian Railroad.

Supplies for Vladivostok.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—More than 10 trains stocked with provisions and

war materials are leaving St. Petersburg daily for Vladivostok.

Russia's New Peace Terms.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—According to the peace reports circulated on the bourse Saturday, Russia will cede the southern part of the island of Saghalien, in the north Pacific, off the east coast of Asia, used as a Russian convict settlement, to Japan, and agree that Manchuria and Korea are permanently outside the Russian sphere of influence. The Chinese Eastern Railroad will be turned over to Japan for cession to China or to an international syndicate upon a consideration of \$125,000,000, which Japan will accept in lieu of indemnity.

Have Got the Money, Too.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—It is announced that the internal loan has been largely subscribed, that applicants will be allotted only 40 per cent.

To Examine British Claims.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—M. De Martens, recently a member of the International Conference on the status of hospital ships, has been appointed to examine claims for compensation growing out of the sinking of the British ship Hipsang.

RESULT OF KAISER'S VISIT.
Sultan of Morocco Declines to Accept Whole of Reform Program.

London, April 3.—A despatch from Tangier to a news agency gives a report that the Sultan already has communicated to the French Minister to Morocco his reply to the French proposals by expressing regret at his inability to accept the whole of the reform program. The Sultan, the despatch adds, agrees to institute reforms at coast ports, but claims the right to raise loans wherever it is most convenient for the country's interest.

Delights Russian Press.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—Emperor William's speech at Tangier and prospective developments therefrom engaged the attention of the Russian newspapers almost to the exclusion of peace discussions. Decided pleasure is expressed at the rocks encountered by the new Anglo-French entente. The Russ terms the visit of the German Emperor to Tangier a demonstration against the entente and points out that refusal of Emperor William to recognize French pretensions must deeply impress the Moroccans to the disadvantage of both France and Great Britain.

Recognition of Independence.
Berlin, April 3.—The Emperor's significant words have produced a strong impression here.

The Lokal Anzeiger, in a despatch from Tangier, says that in replying to the members of the German colony Emperor William said he would make it his business to promote this trade, which was only possible on the assumption of the equality of all the powers and the independence of the land. His (the Emperor's) visit was a recognition of this independence.

BLIZZARD AROUND CALGARY.
Fears for Sheep and Even Cattle Entertained.

Calgary, April 3.—A very heavy blizzard is now raging and considerable anxiety is expressed for sheep and even cattle. The past month has been almost summerlike and seeding is actually completed, so the snow will supply moisture badly needed.

But a bad omen for the immediate future is the fact that prairie dog has not yet put out his winter fur of grey, nor donned the dark habit of spring, without which no old-timer considers permanent summer assured.

Victims of Rare Disease.
New York, April 3.—President Wm. F. Potter, of the Long Island Railroad, who has been ill about one month of cerebro-spinal meningitis, died yesterday.

Cincinnati, Ohio, April 3.—Five deaths from cerebro-spinal meningitis have occurred here during the past week.

Jockey Wonderly Dead.
Memphis, Tenn., April 3.—Jockey Wonderly, the London rider, was taken to a hospital Saturday suffering from a supposed concussion of the brain. While schooling a two-year-old Saturday morning he was thrown into a fence, and his head struck a post. Later, Wonderly's injuries proved fatal.

World's Highest Bridge Complete.
London, April 3.—The British South Africa Co. here has received a cablegram from Victoria Falls, announcing that the bridge over the Zambesi River, the highest in the world, was linked up at 7 o'clock Saturday morning, thus completing another link in the chain of Cape to Cairo Railway.

Must Pay For Confiscation.
Paris, April 3.—Official advice from Caracas, Venezuela, say the decision of the Venezuelan Supreme Court, canceling the French cable company's concession, was accompanied by a recognition of the principle of paying an indemnity for the canceled interests.

Paper Mills Partly Closed.
St. Catharines, April 3.—The Kinloch Mills, which were recently taken over by the W. J. Gage Co. of Toronto, Saturday laid off about half their men. The mill is overstocked and it is decided to shut down one papermaking machine.

Can't Down It.
London, April 3.—(C. A. P.)—On Friday next Col. Lockwood will move the second reading of that hardy annual, the marriage with a deceased wife's sister bill. Lord Hugh Cecil is expected to be its most active opponent.

BOMB THROWN AT LODZ

Police Officer in the Polish City Has Feet Blown Off.

Lured by Phone Message, Police Commissioner Szabaloicz Became Target for a Terrorist Who Carried His Deadly Explosive in a Basket—Accompanying Policeman Drew His Sword and Wounded the Commissioner's Assailant So He Will Die.

Lodz, Russian Poland, April 3.—Police Commissioner Szabaloicz, of the second district was seriously injured Saturday by a bomb, which was thrown at him in the street.

The Police Commissioner had been summoned by telephone to come to the office of the chief of police and started on foot, followed by a policeman. The former noticed at Konstantinowsk and Zawarski streets a poorly clad man carrying a basket. As Szabaloicz approached the man suddenly hurled a bomb, which exploded with terrific force, blowing off the commissioner's foot and severely wounding him in the breast. It is feared his injuries will prove fatal.

Force of the Explosion.
The force of the explosion tore a hole in the ground two feet deep and twelve feet in circumference. The accompanying policeman drew his sword and wounded the commissioner's assailant on the head. When the prisoner was searched a loaded revolver and some cartridges were found in his pockets. He is reported to be dying from the sword cuts received.

The explosion was heard about five miles away. All the windows in the neighborhood were shattered. People in adjoining houses were thrown to the floor. Szabaloicz is hated by the Socialists. He is charged with killing a Socialist during the disturbances here in December last.

Peasant Terrorize Lithuania.
St. Petersburg, April 3.—The latest outbreak of peasant disorders officially reported is in the Wernia district of Lithuania. Regular mobs of peasants are marching through the country, pillaging estates and demolishing the houses of the land-owners. One proprietor was shot. The peasants entered Werra, wrecked the vodka shops, became drunk and terrorized the inhabitants. Troops were called for. The telegraph and telephone wires are cut, and communication with the outside world is severed.

Overshadowed the War.
New York, April 3.—A St. Petersburg despatch to The Herald says that agrarian risings throughout Russia are assuming such serious proportions that they overshadow the war. These organized disorders are the result of the spread of revolutionary literature, urging that such risings are the only means of preventing the bread-winners being sent to the war. As a matter of fact, the troubles render the proposed mobilization impossible.

FOUR KILLED, 40 INJURED.
Mob of Jewish Socialists Meet Troops in Warsaw Streets.

Warsaw, April 3.—A serious conflict occurred at 7:30 o'clock last night in Dzika street, where a Jewish Socialist society known as the Bund had organized a demonstration. The troops which came to disperse the gathering fired into the crowd, killing four persons and wounding 40 others.

The trouble began when, under the pretext of holding a memorial meeting for the late Jewish Socialist leader, a crowd of over 1,000, mostly Jews, carrying red flags, marched into Dzika street and was met by a mixed police military patrol of 20 men. The police declared the Socialists fired revolvers at them, the leaders inciting the mob to attack the patrol, which thereupon, fired several volleys into the crowd. The crowd removed all but nine of the wounded, two of whom were women. These were taken to the hospital. It is expected that two or more of the wounded will die. The police made many arrests.

To Blow Up Schools.
Conditions here are causing much uneasiness and nervousness. Hand-printed proclamations have been found in the streets, warning the public against walking near Government buildings and other places, as bombs would be thrown in these quarters. Several parents whose children are attending school in defiance of the school strike have been warned by letter to withdraw their children, as the school buildings would be blown up.

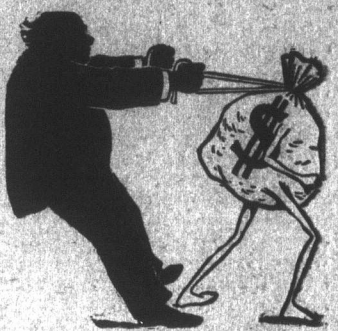
Forbids Cholera Congress.
Moscow, April 3.—The Assistant Minister of the Interior has forbidden the assembling of congress to deal with the cholera epidemic because, according to official information, the promoters of the congress intended to give it the form of a demonstration against the Government.

Murder Affair Was "Arranged."
Berlin, April 3.—A despatch from Tangier received here yesterday announces that the affair of the murder of a German subject named Genthe has been arranged. The two Moors who were implicated have been condemned to imprisonment for life, and the Government of Morocco has undertaken to erect a monument over Genthe's grave and compensate his family.

Francis Genthe, a newspaper correspondent and well known as a writer of hunting and military stories, was murdered in March, 1904, while traveling in Morocco.
