THE CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominica Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Territories, excepting 8 and 26, which has no been homestended, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be sole head of a family, or any mals over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter sec-tion of 198 secres, more or less.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES

A settler who has been granted an or homestead is required by the provision ominion Lands Act and the amer ereto to perform the conditions co erewith, under one of the following p

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) or any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry upon the provisions of this and entered for by such person as a home-stead, the requirements of this Act as to re-sidence prior to obtaining patent may be actified by such person reading with the father actified by such person residing with the father

(5) If a settler has obtained a patent for his homestead, or a certificate for the issue of such patent countersigned in themsomer pre-sure account homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first

(4) If the settler has his normanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his household, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Every homesteader who fails to comply the requirements of the homesteader liable to have his entry cancelled, and the may be again thrown open for entry.
