MARK xiv. 32-42. 1.—The conversation in our previ. ous lesson was evidently carried on as our Saviour and His disciples were walking towards the garden of Gethsemane, a favourite place of resort with them (John xviii. 1, 2). On this memorable occasion He left the majority of the apostles near the entrance, and taking only the favoured three who were chosen to be His companions at such special times. He went on for the purpose of praying. His apostles were accustomed to His

withdrawing, especially in the night season, with this object. He had done it often in the mountains of Galilee, sometimes spending the whole nights in prayer. He evidently felt the need in His great mission of such seasons of sacred retirement and communion with his Father. In this, as in all else, He has left us a perfect example. It is thus that spiritual strength is obtained for life's conflicts and duties. But now the hour which had never been absent from His view was at hand, and its shadows were settling so heavily the roots of the grass, by the action upon Him that He told His three favoured disciples how much His spirit was perturbed, and bidding mulch during summer. He knew that the form was to be the most cruel possible—He was to be crucified. But it was not the prospect of physical pain, however excruciating, which thus filled His soul with horror; but that He was to die as " the propitiation for our sins." It was the judicial expiatory nature of His death that caused His agony. He was to take the place, to endure the curse, to pay the penalty, to suffer the punishment of the guilty; and the contact of His pure soul with guilt, even vicariously, even for the sake of others, even though He would thereby save the guilty, filled Him for the time with a horror that overwhelm-d Him, and led Him to cry to God in

mortal agony. 3 -It is commonly considered that the cup which Jesus prayed might if possible pass from Him was His death. St. Mark's narrative, however, in which the word hour occurs instead of cup (ver. 35), shows that it cannot be so. Nor can it have been in the nature of the case. He knew that it was not possible for the world to be redeemed unless He died. He had kept that death constantly before His mind as the consummation of His incarnation, His life, and teaching. What he prayed might pass from Him or be removed-both expressions are used-was something which it was p ssible for the Father to remove consistently with the great purpose for which He came into the world. That this is so is evident, not only from the terms He uses but from the fact that His prayer was heard (Heb. v. 7). He "was heard in that he feared;" the angel was sent to strengthen Him; the cup was removed when he had sufficiently drawn of it for all the purposes of His passion, and He returned to His disciples in a state of composure.

"In the language of the Old Testament, the portion of men, both of good and evil, is cailed their cup: and the administration of the Divine judgment is frequently expressed under the same figure. Hence we read, 'the cup of trembling,' 'the cup of the Lord's fury: ' and a mixed or empoisoned cup is represented as in the Lord's hand, which His enemies should be obliged to drink. The cup here spoken of by our Lord was His present bitter anguish and unspeakable sufferings. This is plain from comparing the accounts of the evangelists. St. Matthew says 'this cup.' that which He was then drinking; nor does. He pray that the cup of death might not be administered; but, 'Let this cup,' then put into His hands, 'pass from Me. ' Mark expresses the same thing without a figure; 'He prayed that if it Were possible the hour might pass from Him,' clearly meaning that the duration of His sufferings might be shortened. And St. Luke, still nttering precisely the same idea in somewhat varied purase, states the prayer of Jesus to be, 'If Thou be willing, remove this cup from Me. Mightily as He had been strengthened to suffer, He was sinking under a deadly anguist, and prayed that 'if it were possible,' if it were consistent with the Divine purpose, if it could

WINTER CARE OF LAWNS.

Lawns and doorwards are so often neglected during winter that it is no wonder they look so miserable during summer. Grass on lawns should not be cut too short in the fall. A good growth should be left to help protect against the severity of the winters. In addition to this a good covering of manure should be applied just before the winter sets in with severity. If possible, get well-rotted manure, such as will break up fine when put on. Spread as evenly as possible over the lawn, so that every part shall receive a benefit. Do not put it on so thick as to smother the grass, as then more damage than good will result. 1 consider wellrotted manure far ahead of any of the artificial manures for invigorating and keeping a lawn in good condition. FAINTING PERSONS. It is surprising how everybody rushes at a fainting person and strives to raise him up, and especially to keep his head erect. I must have driven a mile to-day, while a lady, fainting, was held upright. I found her pulseless, white, and apparently dying, and I believe that if I had delayed ten minutes longer she would really have died. I laid her head down on a lower level than her body, and immediately color returned to her lips and cheeks, and she became conscious. To the excited group of friends I said :

Always remember this fact : fainting is caused by the want of blood in the brain : the heart ceases to act with sufficient force to send the usual amount of blood to the brain, and hence the person looses consciousness because the function of the brain ceases. Restore the blood to the brain, and instantly the person recovers. In the erect position the blood ascends to the head against gravitation, and the supply to the brain is diminished as compared with the recumbent position, the heart's pulsation being equal. It then you place a person sitting, whose heart has nearly ceased to beat, his brain will fail to receive the blood; while if you lay him down with his head lower than his heart, blood will run into the brain by the mere force of gravity; and in fainting, in sufficient quartity to restore consciousaess. Indeed, Nature teaches us how to manage the fainting persons, for they always fall and frequently are at once restored by the recumbent position in to which they are thrown."-Medical Journal.
