ad J. J. McCaffery Stabbed by Drunken Man.

Toronto, Feb 1.—James J. McCaf-in fery, president of the Toronto Base-ball Club and proprietor of the Bay Tree Hotel, was stabbed in the right arm last night while ejecting an intoxicated man from his hotel. A doctor was promptly summoned and the wound dressed. While the injury is not consiered serious it is of a painful

A man who gives his name as William Delaney, and who claims that he has no permanent place of abode in the city, was arrested a short time atter the stabbing by Policeman Smith and is now held in Court St. station charged with wounding Mr. McCaffery. The prisoner was under the influence of liquor when taken into custody, but strenuously maintains his innocence. He says he was born in England and is about 45 years of age.

About 9.45 o'clock last night Mr McCaffery says Delaney entered his hotel noticeably under the influence liquor, and declared that he intended to make a tour of inspection of the rooms. Mr. McCaffery attempted to dissuade him, but Delaney be-came disorderly, and then Mr. Mc-Caffery found it necessary to put him As he was forcing Delaney through the revolving doors, it is alleged Delaney drew a jack-knife from his pocket and inflicted a deep

wound in Mr. McCaffery's right arm. Once out of the hotel, Delaney made his way north on Bay street. Mr. M. King, of 32 Church street, who witnessed the stabbing, folloy of Deleaney, and at the corner of Temperance street saw Constable Smith. He at once called the officer, and Delaney was placed under arrest. The prisoner was brought back to the ho-tel, where Mr. McCaffery and Mr. King identified him. He will appear in the police court this morning.
