It is quite true that the conditions imposed in the sale of pulpwood differ from those imposed in the sale of pine timber, but there surely should be no difficulty in incorporating in conditions of sale, where property is sold by auction, all the provisions that may be contained in an agreement made in the case of a private contract. An auctioneer can announce that a certain amount of money must be expended in development work within five years from the date of purchase just as easily as a minister can announce it to private buyers in

his office.

All the agreements made by the government subsequent to the first one entered into by it provide that the 40c per cord.
